SUPERVISOR DESENA: I would like to start by wishing everyone a happy Lunar New Year, a 15 day celebration that has begun and we will have a wonderful celebration on February 10th at Mary Jane Davies green at 4:30, if anybody would like to join us. Now I am very excited to present a speaker tonight from the Safe Center of Long Island who has some very important education to share with us. Please come up to the podium.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I would also like to say a few words. Good evening, everyone. It's the custom of the town board prior to town board meetings to honor residents who have done something and deserve special recognition through a point of personal privilege. Tonight we're pleased to welcome Jennifer Rowland, from the Safe Center Long Island in recognition of national human trafficking prevention month. Since 2010, January has been dedicated to raising awareness about human trafficking in ways to identify and prevent it. Unfortunately, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, Long Island is among the top 20 human trafficking jurisdictions in the country. Long Island, I mean, I find that to be a very

alarming statistic.

We will hear tonight from Jennifer from the Safe Center Long Island, and how it strives to protect, assist and empower the victims. So on behalf of Town of North Hempstead, we welcome you here and we turn the floor over to you to say a few words.

MS. ROWLAND: Thank you. Good evening. Again, my name is Jennifer Rowland, and I am the Director of Education at the Safe Center. First and foremost, I would like to thank the Town of North Hempstead Supervisor Jennifer DeSena for allowing me to speak tonight. For those not familiar with the Safe Center, it is a non-profit organization located in Bethpage, New York, that provides free, confidential and comprehensive services for victims of abuse and assault and their non-offending family members, whether that abuse comes from domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, child abuse or elder abuse. Our services include, but are not limited to, hospital and court advocacy, legal services, rapid rehousing and community education. Every Nassau County resident is welcome to obtain these services as we do not discriminate based on race, color, ethnicity, religion, immigration status, sexual orientation, gender or ability. Our hotline can be reached by calling 516-542-0404, and is available to take calls 24/7. Its operators are prepared to answer any questions you may have about our services, provide educational information and resources on abuse and assault, and referrals to the Safe Center or one of our colleague agencies throughout Nassau County. January is human trafficking awareness month. It is time to educate ourselves about human trafficking and especially to learn how to recognize the signs here on Long Island. Human trafficking is defined as the recruitment, harboring, transportation or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act or labor services through the use of force, fraud and coercion. It is a multibillion dollar underground industry. Traffickers prey upon victims regardless of age, race, religion, nationality or gender identity. Human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery. It exists in this country, including all the states and it is present right here on Long Island, and unfortunately in our county. Despite thousands of cases of human trafficking reported annually, many victims go unnoticed. Victims of human trafficking cannot leave because of threats of violence, coercion, deception or abuse. Victims may be afraid to come forward or may not even identify as a victim. The top five risk factors for potential victims of sex trafficking are substance abuse, runaway homeless youth, unstable housing, mental health issues and immigration. How does this happen? Traffickers target individuals with some of the previously mentioned vulnerabilities, those who are easily accessible and can be isolated from others. Through ongoing force, fraud and coercion, the trafficker succeeds in obtaining and maintaining control of that person. They identify potential victims on the street, outside schools, youth programs, parks, truck stops, playgrounds and places of worship, anywhere children or other potential victims can be found. Behavioral indicators in victims include substance abuse, depression, suicidal ideation, hostility, lack of emotional responsiveness and truancy. Physical signs may include unexplained injuries, history of multiple STI's or unwanted pregnancies, or sudden display of valuable items and a mention of an older friend. Victims are often branded with tattoos by their traffickers and held without access to cell phones or connections to family. The Safe Center recognizes human trafficking as an egregious form of psychological and physical violence that requires a compassionate and just response. Our human trafficking department, clients include both male and female victims. Services are provided in multiple languages and include both individual and group therapy by licensed clinicians, crisis counselling, court advocacy, community referrals and case management. The Safe Center also works closely with other agencies and organizations

Long Island to develop a collaborative response for victims of trafficking. In 2014, Nassau County was designated as one of the first counties in New York State to receive safe harbor funding from the Office of Children and Family Services. Safe harbor programs are a collaborative initiative to develop comprehensive networks of child welfare professionals, law enforcement, prosecution, medical personal and services to provide and identify a response to commercial sex exploitation of children. I am proud to say that Nassau County's Department of Social Services has designated the Safe Center as their primary referral source for child trafficking across the county. Additionally, our education department conducts trainings and education sessions for professionals and community members on human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation. Thank you for your time and recognition of human trafficking awareness month. We encourage everyone to wear blue this month to raise awareness about human trafficking and to show your commitment to ending it on our island. The continued support of the Safe Center and its services by the Town of North Hempstead's town board and residents is greatly appreciated. Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Thank you. The Safe Center does wonderful programs in high schools too, we've had them in Manhasset High School for many years, so thank you.

MS. ROWLAND: Thank you.

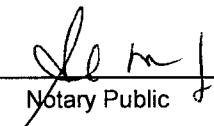

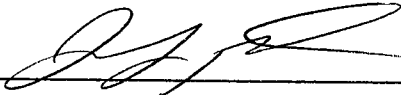

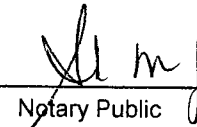

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 6, a public hearing to consider the adoption of an ordinance affecting Aladdin Avenue in Garden City Park, New York. We have a card on this.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: This is a public hearing having to do with a street right off of Denton Avenue that has large vehicles like fire trucks and large ambulances and all kinds of large piece of equipment parked on both sides of the street. I was there yesterday, I'm there often and it's a very dangerous situation in my opinion, and is there anybody here that would like to be heard on this?

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We have a card on this; Michael Ricca.

MR. RICCA: Good evening, Supervisor, Council Members. My name is attorney Michael Ricca, I represent Neville Fleet Service. They operate a facility at 37 Denton Avenue. They are the property owner and business operator of a facility that is 37,000-square feet that provides fleet services to all types of vehicles, including specializing in fire trucks and ambulances with countless other essential vehicles. They provide services to over 30 fire districts and ambulance corps on Long Island alone. We are here to voice opposition to the proposed ordinance to eliminate parking on the north side of Alladin Avenue between Gould and Denton Avenue. Over the years, parking has been restricted on all sides of Neville Fleet's facility, including Denton Avenue and Gould Street. Furthermore, parking on Denton Avenue is problematic on many levels. Most recently, a driver crashed into three legally parked ambulances, causing nearly a half a million dollars in damages. Along with the opposition to this ordinance, I would also like to voice my opposition into how this matter was added to this meeting. Signs were posted on area poles and shortly disappeared, okay, no sign was posted, no notice was given to this business, this law was not posted on the town's website under proposed ordinances. Furthermore, the agenda for this meeting was only posted several days ago. As soon as my client learned of this ordinance, I attempted to contact the town for more information, as the only information we got was through a simple sign that someone happened to take a picture of before it was removed. I was told my only mechanism was to file a FOIL request. I filed said FOIL request immediately. That FOIL request has not been fulfilled. Despite followup letters to the town record officer and both the town attorney, I have received no response whatsoever. Neville provides essential services that keeps fire trucks, ambulances and medical vehicles on the road. Their services are more essential now than ever. Neville employs 20 individuals who support local businesses, they shop in the stores, they eat in the local food establishments, they support the local delis. More importantly, Neville is a tax payer, they're a landowner. The proposal that is put forth was brought by residents in the neighborhood who are attempting to legislate an industrial area out of business, out of existence. The residents bought their homes knowing that they bordered industrial areas. They paid less money for their homes, they pay less taxes to comparable homes in the area. The town board should not support their attempt to line their own pockets by legislating an industrial company in an industrial area out of existence. Homeowners have gone as far as twisting signs that have been legally posted and then calling the police and code enforcement to issue tickets.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Do you know that for a fact? Did you see that?

MR. RICCA: I do, I have pictures if you'd like to see.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You saw this happen? You saw someone physically destroy a sign?

MR. RICCA: The signs were installed and then twisted and then the police department was called and my client's vehicles were ticketed and sent to Nassau County Traffic and Parking Violations with a large majority of the tickets were dismissed because they were not legal tickets. Yes, and I represented him on that matter as well. Okay, this industrial --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You're saying now that within the past couple of weeks, that there were signs taken down that you know that residents took these signs down.

MR. RICCA: That's correct, the signs were posted --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: But did you personally see them take it down?

MR. RICCA: I did not personally see them, but they disappeared from the telephone poles that were --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know signs disappear all the time, for you to be pointing fingers -- a finger at the residents not being sure that they did it is -- I mean, I understand that you work for the people that don't want this to happen, but if you didn't see a resident do it, and now you're saying a resident did it --

MR. RICCA: Nonetheless, the signs did disappear.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You said you have pictures, do you have a picture of a resident doing it?

MR. RICCA: No, I have pictures of the signs being twisted and then there is call to --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You have a picture of a resident twisting the sign?

MR. RICCA: I do not, I do not.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Okay, thank you.

MR. RICCA: So this is an industrial area that was built in the 1940's by a stone mason. Neville keeps that same mantra and dedication of hard work to the community. These parking is more important now than ever to Neville, as vehicles sit crippled for longer times due to supply chain issues and getting parts. I would ask that this request be tabled as my FOIL request hasn't been fulfilled, and I would ask that if this proposal is brought for a vote, that you vote no. To support a local business that operates legally in an industrial area is essential. These are the last four parking spots that border my client's facility. All other parking has been eliminated. I ask you to support them, legal, abiding businessowner that's working hard to provide essential services to our fire departments and ambulance corps, and not support a select few homeowners who are looking to line their pockets. I thank you very much for your time and listening to me this evening.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Before you leave, did you say you tried to contact various departments of this town?

MR. RICCA: That's correct. I submitted a FOIL request, I submitted a letter to the town information officer, and I have copies of those if you'd like me to hand them up.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: The town information officer?

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And who else?

MR. RICCA: And the town attorney's office.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And now you are requesting what?

MR. RICCA: Any documents related, any reports, any studies done or any information that is on file with the town.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Were you contacted by our traffic engineer?

MR. RICCA: I was not.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Was there any effort made by our traffic engineer to contact your client? Were there messages left?

MR. RICCA: No, there was none. My client is here present tonight to --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Do you know if other property owners on the street were contacted by the traffic engineer?

MR. RICCA: I do not know.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: You don't know or?

MR. RICCA: I do not know. As I said, my request for information was not granted. The only mechanism the town's clerks office said was to file a FOIL request for information and that has not been responded to.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'd like to add a little something to this, one second. You know, I drove down there, like I said, yesterday, I drive down there all the time. There is barely room for one car to go down that street, and you said that there were only four spots for these large vehicles that are on the street, but every single spot on the south side of the street is taken up by your client's vehicles, and they are very large, and there was a car accident right on the corner within the last couple of weeks. It's not one person that's complaining, it's several people that are complaining. We sent an engineer over there, I spoke with the engineer, he thought that it's a dangerous situation. I'm not an engineer, but I rely on the town engineer and he told me it was a very dangerous situation and that something needs to be done, and it was the engineer's opinion that this needs to be done for people's safety. I understand, and listen, I'm not somebody who is looking to destroy your small business, and I don't believe your small business will be destroyed by four spaces that you just referred to disappearing. Hold on, you spoke, I didn't interrupt you; so I just want to say it is obviously very dangerous and it is not -- I don't believe for one minute that there are neighbors that are trying to line their pockets in any way and I have to agree with the engineer, the town engineer.

MR. RICCA: Do you have a report, has it been publicly filed? Are we entitled to view that before we bring in our own engineer to do that? We've received no opportunity to even be heard in a meaningful fashion.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You're being heard right now.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: When did you submit your FOIL request?

MR. RICCA: On the 18th. That's correct, that's when we first noticed the signs.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm sorry, when was that?

MR. RICCA: The 18th, I believe it was.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Of January.

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So not really sufficient time for the town to respond to a FOIL request.

MR. RICCA: No, and that's why I would ask that this be tabled to -- they have sufficient time to respond.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: When did you learn this was on the agenda?

MR. RICCA: I'm sorry?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: When did you learn that this was on the agenda?

MR. RICCA: That same day I filed the FOIL request.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: The 18th?

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: The situation that Councilman Walsh talks about, the traffic on both sides of the street, it seems that could cause a -- I'm sorry, with vehicles parked on both sides of the street, it seems like that may cause a difficulty for ambulances and -- I guess you work on ambulances and fire trucks, to get down the street.

MR. RICCA: Yeah, but I think there's more -- less restrictive things, like no parking from here to corner, which allows our vehicle to turn the corner so we make sure that they have egress, not eliminating parking on the entire block. And part of the proposal calls for no parking from here to corner, part of the proposal calls to eliminate all parking spots on the north side of the street.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: That's not correct, because there's parking beyond the four spaces you're talking about going west; is there not?

MR. RICCA: Not between Gould and Denton. This proposal would eliminate every single parking spot that borders my client's property, a 37,000-square foot facility.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: When you say every single spot, you're still talking about four; right?

MR. RICCA: No, because there's been parking restrictions on the back of his property, on the side of his property and on Denton Avenue.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Those are in existence now.

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But this would - -

MR. RICCA: Eliminate the last four spots.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- the last four. And those four spots, as Councilman Walsh was saying, if not, asking, those four spots would be sufficient to put your client out of business?

MR. RICCA: It's just becoming so restrictive between all the other parking restrictions in place and those four spots, they're essential, they're essential to him because, like I said, with supply chain issues and the vehicles being parked longer and inoperable, they're essential to him, yes.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: How would you ask us to weigh the apparent risk created by your business operation versus the difficulty of finding other parking spots?

MR. RICCA: I don't believe this is a risk, this is a low volume street --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But if a fire truck is trying --

MR. RICCA: -- it's legal to park the vehicles on Denton Avenue where it's a major thoroughfare, there's been an accident recently. This is an area where, I don't believe to say only one vehicle could pass, I don't believe is correct. I've traveled down that block myself on several different occasions and two vehicles have no problem egressing through the street.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: That's incorrect, there is no possible way that two cars can egress through that street. There are large trucks --

MR. RICCA: I've seen it myself.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: -- and the vehicles are parked out there 24 hours a day, they're there all the time and, you know, it's just -- I have to agree with the engineer and I don't need an engineer to tell me what my eyes see. There's no room, there's barely enough room for my car to get down that street, with inches on each side, it's a very dangerous situation in my opinion, and if somebody else gets hurt, then what?

MR. RICCA: Well --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Councilman Walsh, I believe --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Listen, I appreciate any help, but I just see it as a very dangerous are situation.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And I believe that we, your colleagues on the council, should defer to you as the local representative, but I would ask, would you even consider continuing this to February 7th to give you the opportunity to meet with the client's attorney to see if maybe there is some compromise that can be worked out?

MR. RICCA: I'd appreciate that.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, first of all, I don't believe there is a compromise to be worked out because I think it's a very dangerous situation, it's been a dangerous situation for a long time. This is ongoing, and your -- the owner of the property has known about this for a long time. And you know, if we give a month, another month, and there's another accident -- and by the way, when you come down that Gould Street, it's difficult to see the busy street of Denton Avenue because there's always vehicles parked

MR. RICCA: It's Alladin, not Gould.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'm sorry, I'm sorry, that's another place. I understand.

MR. RICCA: And I believe there is a compromise, maybe we can say that there's no commercial vehicles and passenger vehicles could be parked there, so I would ask --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: That's what you would like, but that's not what, you know, the neighbors are correct in my opinion that it's a very dangerous situation.

MR. RICCA: I believe there's a compromise that could be had and I would ask that it would be put off for a meeting to see if we could come to a -- to that before we legislate a company that's

been there for 30 years out of business.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Nobody is legislating anything out of business, but we have an engineer that believes that it's dangerous, as I also believe it's dangerous and I just don't see -- you're talking about four spaces, the entire south side of that street is taken up by your vehicles, 24 hour a day. The entire north side of that street is taken up by your vehicles 24 hours a day, and I just don't see where there's a -- it's too big of a risk for me to push this off another day.

MR. RICCA: I respectfully disagree. Neither you, nor the engineer, nor anybody else has ever even attempted to reach out to my client to resolve the issue, and I think at a minimum, he's entitled to that.

MR. CHIARA: Can I just make a note? It's my understanding, I'm just texting with my chief deputy that all FOIL has been fulfilled.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'm sorry, can you

MR. CHIARA: The FOIL was fulfilled, was replied to on the 20th, and the -- I don't know if it was you or your client received the documents.

MR. RICCA: I did not receive the documents. It was made by myself, I have a copy of the request, if you'd like, and I did not receive it.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: If I understand, counsel, the FOIL was responded to; is that correct?

MR. CHIARA: I mean, we have it right for him now. We believe it was responded to, but maybe it was mailed. I don't know.

MR. RICCA: I did not receive anything. I would ask that it be tabled and I thank you all for your time.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, it is really against my better judgment to table this so I can sit down and speak with the owner of that property, because there's nothing that is going to make this safe with all those vehicles parked on both sides of the street. But if that is something that will, you know, help you -- and by the way, the attorney just -- our counsel just said, you know, the FOIL was answered, so there's a lot of -- first you said that you had proof that residents are taking down these signs. You have no proof of that.

MR. RICCA: I didn't say taking them down, I said twisted the signs.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Yeah, but you have no proof of that. You're just saying that --

MR. RICCA: But the signs were installed in one fashion and now they exist in another, and the metal sign, I think with the laws of physics would define that somebody would need to twist that sign.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'm not a lawyer, but a lawyer would say from your lips to God's ears. I don't know that, no one else knows that, that's just your opinion that that's what happened.

MR. RICCA: It just seems very coincidental the sign gets twisted and the police get called.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Councilman Walsh, I don't mean to -- if you're feeling uncomfortable, do what you feel is right. I don't mean to push you to continue.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, I do not want to continue this because I believe it's a

very, very dangerous situation that has existed for a long, long time, and so I'd like to offer the resolution and move for its adoption.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Did you put a card in? We have somebody else that put a card in.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'm sorry.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We have a motion on the floor.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Does anybody else have a card? Does anybody else want to speak?

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We have a motion -- okay. Matthew Maroney.

MR. MARONEY: Yes, thank you for your time. I came here ready to say a few short words. I don't want to turn this into an antagonistic, hostile environment, but I will say, I don't appreciate that any accusations that it must have been the local people turning signs around without any evidence. And quite frankly, if there is an issue that there might not have been enough notice to the businessowner because the local residents were turning the signs, how do we not know that maybe the businessowner turned the sign so that he could then come and say that I need more time and let me keep parking my trucks. Secondly, this is not an auto mechanic's garage with cars, these are gigantic, ginormous trucks on both sides of the road. It's not Ford F-150s and Chevy Silverados, it's New York City huge vehicles, vans, things that go around giving COVID shots. This is, as he said, fire trucks -- I love fire trucks, I hope if, my house is on fire they fix the fire truck to come save me. But contrary to what counsel just said, I lived there for 20 years. I am often avoiding the road because, contrary to what he said, I don't care how many times he went up and down the road, I live up and down the road. You cannot have two cars pass at one time, and moreover, when you're going to approach Denton, you're at least slowing ready to go to a stop sign when suddenly a car goes flying around the corner from Denton onto Alladin. If you're going from Denton onto Alladin and you are that vehicle, you're obviously not stopped at a stop sign or a light and you're just making your left or right turn and come nose-to-nose with another car and there's no place to go. You're either getting rear-ended by another car or you're nose-to-nose with them, as recently just happened. Secondly, I am a full red-blooded American entrepreneur who believes in free-market capitalism. No one's trying to put anyone's business out of business, nor are any of the homeowners in the area trying to line their pockets to put him out of business. If anything, that business has a parking lot with a bunch of big trucks that he works on, and if that business is so booming that it has more trucks to work on than parking spots in its lot, why should the homeowners be subsidizing with their tax dollars a parking lot for his business cars to fix -- that his business fixes? So before we start saying that the homeowners are trying to line their pockets, perhaps the businessowner could rent empty space to park the cars that are on overflow from his lot to be fixed. In fact, just south of that area, where there is a very large storage facility that was recently renovated and opened, it has a big parking lot and I constantly see trucks that are clearly not someone going in and out of a storage facility, they must be renting parking area for area businesses; it's all different businesses that use it to park. I'm not trying to spend the fellows money, but if my business, the businesses that I own, need overflow office space or storage space, I'm not looking to sock off taxpayers to have their taxpayer office space or storage space to subsidize my business. I'll go get more

office space. I'll go get more storage space. I'm not asking anyone else to pay for it, so I don't think taxpayers in the community are trying to line their pockets to the expense of the business. If anything, the businesses using the street that I pay tax dollars for safe ingress and egress on and off of Alladin, and instead I'm -- I can't do it, I'm going around or risking an accident to subsidize a business that's -- it's not just the fire trucks, which are nice and public service things, it's New York City vehicles, so I'm subsidizing New York City vehicles to be repaired too?

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Time, please.

MR. MARONEY: Again, I'm not saying he turned the signs, but if we're going to start going there, who has more of an interest in making the sign disappear so they can come forward and say there's not enough notice for a public hearing. Not likely a bunch of the homeowners, it's the businessowner that's complaining it's gonna hurt him.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: How close do you live to the property?

MR. MARONEY: Right down the block.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: How far is that?

MR. MARONEY: I can't say how far it's --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: A hundred feet, half a mile, a mile?

MR. MARONEY: It's not a mile, it's, you know, maybe a quarter mile, tenth of a mile, something like that.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Were you contacted by the town's traffic engineer?

MR. MARONEY: I know I wasn't, I don't know about my wife.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Maybe you want to hear from the attorney again, but the cars that park on -- the vehicles that park on the street, are they there for a long time?

MR. MARONEY: Yes, I mean, it's not like it's a one day park in and out, sometimes I see them there for a very long time, other times I don't. Now, it could certainly be the supply chain that countries in a disaster place, but that shouldn't make my street unsafe.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: That I think is your illusion to the government subsidizing his business by affording him parking space, the trucks are gonna sit there for many days; is that what you're suggesting?

MR. MARONEY: My illusion is not any illusion. If I start getting told that, not me, personally, it's the people that live here trying to line their pockets?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: No, I understand, but can I ask the attorney --

MR. MARONEY: No, no, no, I'm just trying to answer your question. I'm not --there's no illusion, but if we say that, I'm not benefitting from the street for my business --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I understand.

MR. MARONEY: It's his businesses that are benefitting.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I think my question would better be answered by the client. I'm going to ask the attorney to come back up. So, do you know, is it the case that vehicles are parked in the spots we're talking about for longer than a day?

MR. RICCA: All different periods, they shuffle, they move --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But it could be longer than a day.

MR. RICCA: It could be, yes.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So in effect, we're providing a parking lot, an on-street parking lot, my characterization, on-street parking lot for these vehicles.

MR. RICCA: I would say that's not a fair characterization because the vehicles move, it's public parking --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Well I just asked you, are they --

MR. RICCA: My client's a landowner, a taxpayer, and to say that the parking is subsidized by the town when my client is paying commercial taxes in an industrial area, I don't believe is fair.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I didn't say that, what I asked you was, are the vehicles parked there for longer than a day, and you seem to say, yes, that can happen.

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: More likely that they are than not, and I, like I said, I drive, my legislative assistant drives by there everyday, and we see the same cars there, sometimes huge busses, huge ambulances from Brooklyn and they don't move from days on end - -

MR. RICCA: So if the problem is large vehicles --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Hold on, they don't move for days on end --

MR. RICCA: -- Why would -- why would

COUNCILMAN WALSH: So it's not like they're there -- well, you're talking over me, I didn't talk over you. One at a time. So both sides of the street are being used to store your client's vehicles for long periods of time, and long periods of time are more than two or three days. I've seen the same vehicles there for more than two or three days without being moved.

MR. RICCA: So why can't we have the proposal to be amended to be "no commercial vehicles in that 138 feet of space," and just passenger vehicles, his employees, other essential vehicles that need to come to that location everyday be able to park there and come to some type of compromise.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: We're talking about four spaces.

MR. RICCA: In a place --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It's a very dangerous situation.

MR. RICCA: In a place that lacks sufficient parking. So those four spaces mean a lot to my client.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Does your client have other spaces that he rents to store these places other than on the street?

MR. RICCA: No.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No. Can he? Can he? I'm sure he can find the space.

MR. RICCA: But why do we --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Why? Because it's dangerous.

MR. RICCA: You said commercial vehicles are dangerous, why can't we put --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: There was a huge car accident there within the past couple of weeks. There's been other car accidents there. It's a dangerous situation. I know you don't want to accept that. Listen, I'm not an engineer. Like I said, the engineer also agrees that it's a dangerous situation, and I just think if we wait two weeks and somebody gets injured, I'll feel responsible.

MR. RICCA: Have you spoken to the engineer to find out if that passenger vehicles would also be a problem?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I have spoken to the engineer more than once about the situation, I met him onsite and he told me that this is -- he agreed with me that it's a dangerous situation.

MR. RICCA: Did you ask the engineer if passenger vehicles would be a problem and a danger?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No, I did not ask him that, because I haven't seen passenger cars. What I've been seeing is large vehicles and everything always comes down to enforcement. Everything always comes down to enforcement, and, you know, what happens if we agree to something and then all of a sudden you do whatever you want anyway?

MR. RICCA: That's with any -- council member. We cannot limit it so drastic because a measures needs to be taken, we don't have to go to the most extreme of eliminating.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I don't believe this is extreme, I believe it's a safety issue.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I read -- I'm reading the report and also I'm reading an opinion, and it is saying with parking on both sides it makes it very narrow, and that there is insufficient space for two vehicles to pass each other. School busses often use the street to access Denton, making it more challenging. So there is -- there is something there that's stating that the parking on the both sides is making it very narrow and it's making a dangerous situation.

MR. RICCA: Are you talking about this proposal, is that what --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Yeah.

MR. RICCA: Yeah, but that same proposal says commercial vehicles, it does not say anything about passenger vehicles, and you've taken a measure that says -- that has a problem with commercial vehicles and eliminating all vehicles.

MR. MARONEY: Mr. Troiano, I think you asked him to step back up to respond to you.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: He did.

MR. MARONEY: Are we done with that, can I --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Let me just ask you, you're suggesting that the sign restriction be to commercial vehicles.

MR. RICCA: That's correct.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: How would that help you?

MR. RICCA: That would add four parking spots for his employees.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Where do they park now?

MR. RICCA: On the street, in his lot, really depends on availability.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: If you're looking for the employees, I mean I don't know what the parking restriction is, but if you look at the map, they could just turn the corner and park on Denton. There's parking there. I see parking. Look, there's a car right there parked.

MR. RICCA: There's been parking restrictions on Denton as well; right? No commercial all night.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Yeah, but you're talking about employees, they're not commercial.

MR. RICCA: There's a parking issue in the area in general, so eliminating more parking would greatly affect my client. I don't think -- if there's a safety issue for commercial vehicles, let's eliminate the commercial vehicles and let's allow passenger vehicles so we avoid the safety issue and we don't cripple my client's business.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It's not the intent to cripple anybody's business. My intent is to see that nobody else gets injured over there, and there has been people injured and you're aware of that. It's just that there are way too many extremely large vehicles on both sides of the street and we're talking about four spaces and that's where I stand.

MR. RICCA: I would ask that we don't need to take such drastic measures.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Everything that we do here is reviewable.

MR. RICCA: I understand that.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: This isn't the ultimate answer. Everything we do is reviewable.

MR. RICCA: Why do we have to waste our resources on that? We could come to a compromise that creates --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You just want to keep overlooking the safety issues.

MR. RICCA: -- that solves the safety issue. We could solve the safety issues.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I don't believe that. Thank you.

MR. RICCA: Thank you all.

MR. MARONEY: May I just --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Yes, you can.

MR. MARONEY: Again, to continue to focus on crippling a business, no one is more probusiness than me. It's even going into, like, well then, what about my employees' parking? He just said his client has a parking lot for trucks and cars. The reason it's so hard to find parking there is because the business is so good that they can't fit anymore cars in their own parking lot. Now, taxpayers don't pay for his parking lot that he owns on his property, but we are paying for him to park the trucks that are not on his parking lot. And again, if my office runs out of office space, I don't get to go use the taxpayer's dollar to get more office space, I have to rent more office space in my building. And when my closed files need to be filed somewhere, I don't get to come to the town and put it in, I don't get to go to his business and put it in, I rent storage space. To continue to say that the commercial traffic, that that's the problem, it's the commercial vehicles, the entire block says actually no commercial traffic. We've had hearings

here before in prior years, or at at least had made phone calls, maybe not hearings but we made phone calls to our representatives to contact businesses that were using -- instead of sitting in traffic, the big trucks on Jericho or Hillside, they try to cut down that block because it connects New Hyde Park Road to Denton, and it's supposed to be no commercial traffic. So for the very same reason that there's not supposed to be huge, commercial traffic navigating on either direction down that block, it's not supposed to be huge, commercial traffic. Why? Because it's dangerous to have all the big trucks, there's not enough room to pass, there's no cars to pass. Well, then, there's no different situation than actually having them park there. It's not that, oh, it might be for a day or two or a little bit overnight. A lot of them are there very long-term. But even if they're not, the minute one leaves another one comes. So obviously the business entity knows we need storage parking spaces to store the vehicles we're working on, and I guess there's so much business now that it's overflowing into the street. Then go rent a lot to park the trucks or tell Chazbolla [sic] or other fire departments or tell the city of New York with their ambulances. I don't know why, you know, I have to have city vehicles parked on my block. Maybe if we're not yet ready to store it to fix it, ask them to keep it at their facility and then bring it in when you're ready to work on it, not leave it in front of my block. No one is trying to line their pockets. If anything, the profit business is getting free truck storage place on my dime.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: We had heard that, I understand.

MR. MARONEY: And it is a safety issue. Maybe they would think differently if their kids were driving up and down the block or I was with my kids. I approach that thing, cars are coming flying and you're like, do I back up, there's nowhere to go.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Okay, thank you.

MR. MARONEY: Thank you, thank you for your time.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: So, I believe that it is a safety issue. Like I said, I've driven up and down that street at least 25 times in the last couple of months. I've never seen at any time when I drove up and down there nothing -- I've always seen large vehicles from Brooklyn, from the City, a fire truck from the South Shore, huge tow trucks. I'm glad that you are have a very successful business, and I think that having a successful business, you probably can arrange to have another lot somewhere where you can store the stuff, but I think it's an extreme safety issue and it's been going on for a long, long time and I would like to offer the resolution and move for its adoption.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Walsh.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Lurvey.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I'm really convinced by the traffic engineer's report that talks about the traffic and safety issues for motorists and emergency vehicles, and I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Adhami.

COUNCILMAN ADHAMI: I've reviewed the traffic safety study and the complaint that I see is the parking of commercial vehicles. I don't know if there is any other possible solutions, but I wish they would have been explored. Nonetheless, I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Dalimonte.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I truly believe in the Town of North Hempstead traffic engineer and I am deferring to the councilman on this. He lives there, he's been on this road, he says it's a safety issue and also the traffic engineer stated that, and I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Supervisor DeSena.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Thank you.

Councilperson Walsh offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which resolution was declared adopted after a poll of the members of this Board:

ORDINANCE NO. 2 - 2023

A PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER THE ADOPTION OF AN ORDINANCE AFFECTING ALADDIN AVENUE IN GARDEN CITY PARK, NEW YORK.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that, after a public hearing duly held by the Town Board of the Town of North Hempstead, the following ordinance was ordered adopted:

**ORDINANCE NO. T.O. 2 - 2023
GARDEN CITY PARK, NEW YORK**

Section 1. All motor or other vehicles of any kind shall comply with the following regulations:

PROPOSAL:

ADOPT:

1. ALADDIN AVENUE – NORTH SIDE – NO STOPPING HERE TO CORNER
From the east curb line of Gould Street east for a distance of 30 feet.

2. ALADDIN AVENUE – NORTH SIDE – NO STOPPING ANYTIME
From a point 30 feet from the east curb line of Gould Street, east, for a distance of 138 feet.

Section 2. All ordinances or regulations heretofore adopted in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. PENALTIES: “A violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine, or when applicable, by imprisonment, not in the excess of the amount set forth in the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York, or by both such fine and imprisonment, plus any surcharge payable to other governmental entities, and late payment, if applicable.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect ten days from the date of its publication and posting pursuant to Section 133 of the Town Law of the State of New York.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be incorporated in the Uniform Traffic Code of the Town of North Hempstead.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 8., a public hearing to consider the rescission of an ordinance affecting Lindberg Boulevard in Carle Place, New York. We have a card on this.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Do we have any cards on this?

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Yes, David Vigues.

MR. VIGUES: Thank you for the opportunity to speak before you. I'm gonna actually oppose this --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Can you move back a little?

MR. VIGUES: I oppose the rescission of this parking restriction. I don't know if you've been on the block. Currently, on the north side of the block, our half; I'll speak about my half, it's a one hour parking on the second half from Wright Avenue Lindbergh to Old Country Road, it is a no parking at all. So what you in essence will be doing is you will be telling those commercial businesses, the restaurant owners and their valet companies, that our end of the block will become a de facto parking lot. That is -- you talk about safety, that is a safety issue. Secondly, with the growth of the Long Island Railroad with the third rail being a quarter mile away from the third rail, our block will now be also a commuter parking zone with no parking, cars will be able to park in front of our house 24 hour a day, seven days a week. Additionally with the growth of the short-term rentals of Airbnb, even our neighbors using and renting out their swimming pools on sites such as Sweepley, where they advertise that they can accommodate ten guests and ten cars for a rental of an hour, my question is, where are those cars parking? I can tell you where, in front of our house on the dead end, between Lindbergh Boulevard and Wright Avenue. Also, as the parents of young children, there's some comfort knowing we could have our children go out and play in front of our house with other neighborhood children without having cars coming and going. That's one of the reasons we bought the house on a dead end, for the safety of our children. I'm asking -- it's really impacting six houses, there's no reason to lift this restriction that's been in place for so many years. You talk about safety. Also, if you eliminate the parking restriction, essential services cannot get down the dead end. On the weekends -- there is no parking restrictions, when our neighbors have parties, get together, our dead ends becomes the parking lot for our neighbors, we've accepted that. Trying to get in and out with a minivan, we have to squeeze in and out, so try -- imagine an ambulance trying to get in there. It's very challenging. It's a small community, it's -- like I said, a small block, but it will have significant impacts on our community and our block. Thank you.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm not sure I understand your argument about safety. This is not -- this is not -- I mean, currently, parking is not restricted on Lindbergh; right?

MR. VIGUES: It is, one hour parking.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: One hour parking, but people can park there.

MR. VIGUES: One hour.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So you're saying -- you're thinking that if this restriction is removed, people will park there all day, either commuters or shoppers or restaurant goers, and what, the activity of them moving their vehicles when they come back will create a danger for your kids?

MR. VIGUES: The kids in the neighborhood. There's no -- I don't know if you go down the

block, there's really no stop signs, people come flying, it's become a cut-through from Old Country Road to Jericho Turnpike.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Whether there's one hour parking or all day parking, that's not going to change; right?

MR. VIGUES: No, but it's still a danger with all -- now you're adding cars into this little neighborhood with people cutting through, it doesn't --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Why are you adding cars?

MR. VIGUES: Because now you're adding cars that park there all day long.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So you have more -- with the one hour restriction, don't you have more traffic and more potential risk because drivers -- people driving their cars, they park there for an hour then they would move, that creates one opportunity for an accident --

MR. VIGUES: But I can tell you --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- then somebody else pulls, creates a second opportunity.

MR. VIGUES: For someone that's lived there for 15 years, my wife has lived in the house for 30, that hasn't been an issue. Historically, that has not been an issue.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Were you contacted by our traffic engineer?

MR. VIGUES: The only way I knew about this is there's a posting on my light post. I thought it was someone advertising for a garage sale and -- I was like, oh, where's the garage sale, and I saw this, I'm like, whoa, what's going on? There has been no communication.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: What I'd like to be able to do is to talk with you some more to understand your concerns. Honestly, I don't see them right now, but I'd like to have the opportunity to talk with you and maybe some of your neighbors, so I'm going to ask that the council -- I'd like to offer -- I'd like to make a motion to continue this hearing until February 7th.

MR. VIGUES: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And if you wouldn't mind calling my office tomorrow so we can make an appointment so we can talk.

I feel really bad for the people who are here for public comment, and I know we haven't done this before, but I didn't know that it was in the rules that we are allowed to do it, so I know that now because I read the town procedures for this meeting. I would like to suggest that the board allow those who are still here, I know it looks like some people have already left, but those who are still here to speak on public comment to speak. In order to do that, we would have to suspend the town rules. I would like to move to suspend the town rules and allow the people who are here to speak during public comment to speak now.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Walsh.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Lurvey.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Adhami.

COUNCILMAN ADHAMI: No.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Dalimonte.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Supervisor DeSena.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I find this very unusual because we have a procedure, and yes, some residents did leave because we told them we had to get through the town business first, so I don't know what you have up your sleeve, I don't know what you have planned that now suddenly you have to have public comment. I know that I have people waiting to speak on items later in the agenda, so why do they have to wait? Everybody knew that it was 30 minutes of public comment, and by the way, you both used some of that time expressing your own views about Mr. Santos, so I think it's fair we get on with the business of the town.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I don't know why you have to imply that there's something nefarious going on when I am just looking to

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No one has ever done this.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Hold on, excuse me. When I'm looking at people and thinking they're going to be here for a very long time, and I'm thinking that maybe they would like to speak and typically the town board biases towards letting residents speak, and I take offense at, you know, having something up my sleeve. I really take offense at that comment, I think making that kind of comment is just unnecessary and out of line.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: And by the way, Supervisor Bosworth did extend the public comment period when needed when there was an issue --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: At the end of the meeting.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: At the end of the meeting, that we have done at the end of the meeting.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: And we will do that at the end of the meeting.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: During the meeting --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I have been here for a year and I have never seen anyone on this dais ask that we interrupt the business agenda to have additional public comment, so --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: And it's not fair to the people that want to comment about other things that are going on.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: They're here to talk about the business.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Yeah, there are people sitting here that I am aware of that want to speak about other subjects --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: About the

COUNCILMAN WALSH: -- and they're going to have to wait now, so let's make them wait so people can continue to comment about George Santos. And I'm not saying anything is nefarious, but I find it kind of odd that people are all lined up week after week to comment about George Santos, and I don't hear anybody complaining about the Governor of New York State looking to take code away from villages and the town in order to allow whatever the State wants to do with code. I would think that that would be a little offensive, more so than beating a dead horse of whatever the guy's name is -- I don't even believe his name is Santos, and we're all aware of that and we're also all aware that the Supervisor has no control over getting rid of Mr. Santos. It's a federal issue, it's a federal issue. But I guess we're going to vote and continue to

beat this dead horse, so, well, let's get on with the show.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We also have a News 12 camera here which is not typical, so that's another reason why I wonder what -- why are we interrupting our business. You have the votes, so you'll do what you wish, but I vote no.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: There's typically -- you know, once a councilman has voted, he's -- or council member has voted, he or she is prohibited from speaking again, but Councilman Walsh took the opportunity to speak and I'd just like to say in terms of there's being something nefarious going on, I -- you know, as you know, everybody on this board knows, I am also the member of a school board, and a few years ago we used to have two different sessions in our school board presentations. We had an upfront point where people could speak, and at the end of the meeting speak again. We collapsed those into one, right at the very beginning of the meeting to give everyone an opportunity to say what they wanted to on items that didn't affect the agenda. Those that had a comment about the specific agenda item would be more willing to wait because that was something that really drew their interest to come to the particular meeting. So that's my rationale. I wasn't aware that we could suspend the rules and continue that, so I think now that I've learned that, I think it's a great opportunity to take that opportunity to do just that.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Yeah. To allow that, to build -- when you're building that building, during construction to put that outlet.

MR. O'DONNELL: You remember -- recall Mr. Gaffney going into quite a discourse on how hazardous having this contraption installed in the opening or outside, and you're going now -- they want to install this into a building where people are going to be living in.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: It's just, I believe, just the electrical outlet.

MR. O'DONNELL: You're going to be charging station inside, say an apartment house or et cetera, et cetera.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I think the safety will certainly be part consideration of the drafting.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I just think, if you don't mind, I need to correct what you just said. With all due respect, Mr. Gaffney's point and other peoples point have been that certain electric vehicles, the vehicles themselves may cause the fire -- may have a fire hazard, a fire risk. It's not the charging of the vehicles, it's not the charger of the vehicles, it's the vehicles themselves.

MR. O'DONNELL: The apparatus, you put your plug into the outlet; right --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Correct.

MR. O'DONNELL: -- to charge your vehicle. Now, inside the wall, there's a facility to be able to charge your vehicle. It's not like just plugging into the socket.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: No, it is, actually. You can have it -- I just got an electric vehicle, so I know this. You could just plug it into the outlet in the house, but that outlet has to

be capable of carrying the proper current, so you should get an electrician to make sure that the wiring back to your fuse box and the fuse box can handle it.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I would just like to interrupt and say that this public hearing will be March 14th. Are you available? C'mon, you have --

MR. O'DONNELL: I'm having surgery that day.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Oh, on March 14th?

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Yes, ma'am.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: So this is to consider an appointment to the town's Board of Ethics, Rachel Fox of Port Washington. Last January, I discovered that we had two vacancies on the ethics board, and that five members were serving in holdover terms as their terms had expired years ago. Since then, I've made it a priority to install an independent and autonomous Board of Ethics in defined, staggered terms for almost a full year now. A few months back, we successfully installed four members into new, defined terms, but the Board of Ethics is still left with three members who were serving as holdovers from previous administrations and expired terms. Having a truly independent Board of Ethics who are capable of exercising meaningful oversight in staggered and undefined terms is crucial to preventing conflicts of interest and misdeeds. Under town code, it is the Supervisor's responsibility to appoint the seven members of the town board, taking into account the concerns and recommendations of my fellow board members. As such, when I settled on tonight's nominee for appointment to the ethics board, I spoke to Councilwoman Dalimonte to let her know I would be nominating someone from her district. Rachel is a longtime Port Washington resident who has been active in her community, through a number of groups and organizations, such as the Port Washington Community Chest, the Port Washington Bandshell Committee, Residents Forward and the Port Washington Crisis Relief Team. Rachel has also been a librarian at the Port Washington Library for over 20 years and currently serves as the director of children's services. On top of this, Rachel is a proud member of the LGBT+ community, and her appointment would represent some added diversity and equity to our board of ethics. Although she would be replacing someone on the Board of Ethics who has served with great dignity, this individual has been on the board for a great number of years, and sometimes change is necessary to better reflect the times we live in. Rachel is a woman of great integrity who cares about her community and I believe she will be an excellent addition to our Board of Ethics and a refreshing infusion of new viewpoints and ideas. As pursuant to the revised ethics law the town board passed earlier this year regarding nominees for boards and commissions, submitting financial disclosure 30 days in advance for review by our Board of Ethics, Rachel submitted hers in a timely manner and was approved by our Board of Ethics. Approving the appointment of Rachel Fox will bring us one step closer to giving the town for the first time in a number of years, an ethics board serving in defined, staggered terms, independent and autonomous of outside influence. A fully independent ethics board will give the town the strongest ethical firewall against conflicts of interest and misdeeds. With that, I am proud to offer this resolution.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Independence to me means that no one Supervisor replaces all the ethics board members during one term, as Supervisor, you mentioned. The town board did approve Rabbi Perl to fill a vacancy, Robin Boiling to fill a vacancy, and we reappointed Joe Sciame, and we reappointed Isma Chaudhry. That leaves Betty Leong, Rabbi Widom, and the honorary Richard Kestenbaum in holdover terms. My concern with your continued attempt to replace these three remaining people is that we will have a board that was all put in place under one supervisor. My recommendation is that Betty Leong be put into a term that ends December 31, 2024, that Rabbi Widom put into a term that ends December 31, 2025, and that the honorary Richard Kestenbaum be put in a term that ends December 31, 2026. This will result in all the ethics committee members being in staggered terms and it will have the additional benefit of having a mix of experienced people who have been doing this for decades with the new people that we appointed this year.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Two of the members who have been reappointed have been serving and do bring the experience that we need, and it is the Supervisor's responsibility to have the independent board. This could have been avoided if the past administration had nominated additional members. There is nothing in the code that says that only -- you can only replace -- what you've proposed is simply not the law of the Town of North Hempstead. So, I ask that you that we please call the role.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I'd like to say something. So you bring up the word independent, but Ms. Fox is a very good friend of yours and I have a personal relationship with her. I made it clear to you, Supervisor, that I was not for this and that I will be abstaining. We aren't supposed to appoint people we have personal relationships for obvious reasons. It's really embarrassing that you keep -- that's the second time you're putting her up and I feel like it's very -- it's embarrassing. I feel bad for her because then she's -- you know, there's an article written about her in the local papers and I ask you to stop -- to please stop doing that to these people. You're friendly with her and I'm friends with her and she is a wonderful person, but you have a personal relationship with her. It should be independent, the word you keep on using is independent, and it should be independent. You can take the roll, that's all I have to say.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: When someone is well known in the community, a lot of people have relationships with them. That's the purpose, is to have somebody who is respected and known in the community. And being a friend is not -- that is not in the code. You are inventing something and I don't remember you discussing being a friend of Kim Kaiserman when we voted on her for the North Hempstead housing --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: That wasn't the ethics committee.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You're just making it up. That's not the rule --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: It's the ethics committee --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: -- it's not --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: -- they review stuff for us. We have questions, we go to them. They review us. I don't want -- I don't think a friend of ours should be on that committee.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: They are here for the use --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: That's the way I feel.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You're very concerned with review of you. This board is for all of the staff of the town, for hundreds of employees.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I said all -- I said us.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I certainly have no idea what the woman looks like, so she's not a friend of mine --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: No, that's

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I mean, we --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Everyone is saying she's a friend of everybody, I couldn't pick her out of a lineup.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I'm sorry, Dennis, I said she's a friend of the Supervisor's.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Yeah, but then later you said we can't be picking friends of ours, ours.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I'm friends of ours.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It's ours, ours is me, I'm sitting here. I don't know the woman.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We have many professional friendships. I met Rachel Fox this past year when I became the Supervisor. I have many professional friendships. I am friends with Robin Boiling, yet Councilman Troiano didn't object when I nominated her.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I object, I'm sorry, this is -- it's my vote.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Okay, well you have decided not to vote. Let's please call on the other members. Mr. Troiano, last time you admired Rachel Fox's background, but you thought I could not offer her in the place of an Asian woman, even though I had also nominated two other Asian-Americans. So, I'm hoping you still feel the same.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I just -- before we get to that, I just wanted to say I take exception to your linking the fact that Judge Kestenbaum, because really -- because he's a holdover somehow can't be independent, so that's a false - -

SUPERVISOR DESENA: The term is four years. This is not a lifetime appointment. This is what people need to understand. It's not a lifetime appointment to the ethics board, it's four years. And by the way, it was shortened from six to four, which shows the intent that we bring new people. New people want to get involved.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But, Jen, that wasn't my point. My point was, just because somebody is a holdover, especially somebody with the distinguished background as a Judge in one of our localities in the Town of North Hempstead, it doesn't mean that they automatically lack independence. That was my point, and that was the kind of logic case were you building up. You are right, though, that the reason for my vote against Ms. Fox last time you brought her up was because I had been preaching from this seat since you began this over a year ago now, that the ethics committee members ought to look like the town in terms of its demographic makeup, and that I didn't see that removing an Asian-American woman from the ethics committee fulfilled that, what I see, as an imperative of all the people that, as a body, that fill in the ethics committee. But, I have also been saying, since the very beginning, that the Supervisor, as written in town code, which I can read to you if you'd like, requires that you to take due consideration of your council members' recommendations, and I don't see that that's being done in this case. Yes, you spoke to Ms. Dalimonte --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: And I sent her a letter back.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- and she gave you her feedback, and you dismissed that. When you spoke - -

SUPERVISOR DESENA: She said that she

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Let me just --the contrast, though, with Ethics Committee Member Boiling, who I have a relationship with that's both professional and friendly, you did talk with me, and we had a give and take. That does not seem to have occurred in this instance, and so for that reason, on this occasion, I'm going to vote no.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Of course.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Can we start over? We have a motion on the floor. Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I just voted no.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: I think Judge Kestenbaum has served with distinction and honor, and I don't understand the Supervisor's motives for trying to replace him. I vote no.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Walsh.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, I'm not exactly sure who it is, but I believe that somebody on that ethics board is there for more than 50 years. These jobs are not meant to keep forever. I don't know how long Judge Kestenbaum was there, but I have a feeling that it's more than 20 years. Again, these jobs are not meant to keep forever, and I vote yes to bring somebody new into the ethics board.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Lurvey.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: No.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Adhami.

COUNCILMAN ADHAMI: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Dalimonte.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Just to reiterate, I sent Supervisor DeSena an e-mail on October 28th, 2022, explaining that I will be abstaining from this vote.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Supervisor DeSena.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I had the conversation with Councilwoman Dalimonte and she expressed that she is a woman of great integrity and would be a great member of the ethics board.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I did not say that.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Yes, you did.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: No, I didn't. Read my letter.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: And then you said -- yes, and then -- okay, I'm not reading. And then you said, but I won't support her because we're friends, and that is just not a factor we consider. I did speak with you and you did feel she was a woman of great integrity and would be a good member of the board. That is what I thought was important and that is why I nominate her, and I vote yes. Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: She is a lady -- she is a -- great integrity, and as I said in my letter to you on October 28th, I don't like people putting words in my mouth because I do my research before -- you know, I do my research, so. I did send you this letter, and if anyone, because I do know press is here, would like to receive a copy of the letter, I'd be more than happy to give it to you.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, I'm a little confused here because I thought abstaining was that you don't get involved --

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: You voted already.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I know, but that's what I was going to say. She also voted already, then the Supervisor voted and then Councilwoman Dalimonte spoke again --

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: I think --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: So -- well now you're cutting me off, you could speak after I finish, but what I'm gonna say is that I guess we have no rules here because before it was said, well, I already spoke and I shouldn't speak, and, you know, now we're all doing it. Are there new rules?

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Councilman Walsh, you put words in my mouth and I want to correct the record.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I didn't put words in your mouth --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: No, I didn't say you, I said she did --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You said she did.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: -- So I wanted to correct the record, that's why I spoke.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: So I guess we changed the rules and we're allowed to speak whenever we want.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Why don't you allow Councilwoman Dalimonte to speak?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: She can! She can, but I was corrected before.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: That's all I'm asking.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: But I was corrected before and say that I spoke out of turn. So if I speak out of turn, others are speaking out of turn, maybe we change the rules.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: No one addressed anything to you just now.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No, but I'm speaking, I'm entitled to speak because everybody gets to speak here.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: All right, let's call the next item, please.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 36 --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I can speak if I choose to speak --

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Yes, you're allowed to.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 36.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Thank you. I guess we change the rules.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 36, a resolution confirming the reappointment of Joseph Sciamè to the Town of North Hempstead Board of Ethics.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I offer the resolution and move for its adoption.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Does anybody know how long Mr. Sciamè has been on the ethics committee? Does anybody know how long Mr. Sciamè has been on the ethics committee? I can tell you when I first became a councilman in Jan 1 of 2 004, he was on the ethics committee.

We heard earlier from Mr. Walsh that we need some new blood, and that was his reason for voting to have Mr. Kestenbaum removed.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: That was not my reason and now you're putting words in my mouth.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Sciame has been there for a long time as well and served ably and admirably, and yet, we're not seeing the same move to have him removed. I wonder why. I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Walsh.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Abstain.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Lurvey.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I vote aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Adhami.

COUNCILMAN ADHAMI: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Dalimonte.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Supervisor DeSena.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Item No. 38, a resolution authorizing the transfer of ARPA funds from the general fund to a capital fund for the Manhasset Sewer Conversion Project.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: This next resolution --

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Oh, we have a card.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Okay.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: This is Robert Donno.

MR. DONNO: I do have an agenda. It's nice to see everybody.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Thank you for waiting.

MR. DONNO: Its quite all right. I was actually hoping to have two bites at the apple so I could get up here and speak twice. Literally, so, so I would get. I'm Robbie Donno, I'm with the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce. As you all know, we have been at the forefront of trying to get the sewer district -- the sewers into Manhasset, but I have to make a couple of comments and I'm hoping that we come out of this with a unanimous vote, for a lot of reasons. I want to go to this. The resolution mentions the capital fund for the Manhasset Sewer Conversion Project. This isn't just about Manhasset, I want you to think bigger, because what we're doing right now with the cesspools that we have that service these business and whatnot, is we're really polluting Manhasset Bay. The impact in Manhasset Bay doesn't stay in Manhasset. There's Kings Point, Sands Point, Great Neck, Kensington, Thomaston, Manorhaven, Port Washington North, Baxter Estates, Port Washington, Plandome, Plandome Heights, Plandome Manor and Manhasset. All of these communities are impacted by what we're doing. The ARPA funds that we have, when we put this together, we didn't realize that we had a template that is -- could be used for other communities or other sections of the Town of North Hempstead to put in sewer districts. This empowers the individuals to join as long as we have the spurs that go into the individual properties, which is what really the ARPA money is for. It's to finish what the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District and Assemblywoman Sillitti had garnered the \$5 million for, but the template is really important because it's a building block for other community and we found a way of doing this and doing this easily without having an ex -- you know, sections of North Hempstead to the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, and it does give the individual the decisionmaking and empowers the people that we have, which is what we're supposed to do. I didn't design this, but through our research and hiring smart attorneys and investing in this, the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce and our partners have really done a good job and I'm thrilled with this. I still think that we have to look even bigger than that, because I know that Councilwoman Dalimonte has been at the forefront of putting oyster farms in the water, which are incredible. I didn't know this until about a year ago, but in terms of cleaning up the water. So if we were to envision something that really makes a difference, maybe we can get some of our state people and certainly councilwoman -- Assemblywoman Sillitti is on board, and our State Senator, to think about dredging the end of Manhasset Bay and doing other projects. In your vote, you're giving people a vision of what the future could be and what the past used to be. My parents used to swim in that water over there. Nobody in their right mind would swim in it today. One on one politics tells you that you don't mess with an infrastructure project. This is something that impacts a wide variety of people and gives us a vision for something much better, not only for Manhasset, not only for the Manhasset business community, but for all the residents that are on the shorelines of Manhasset Bay. So I'm here, my agenda tonight is to ask you to

votes for this, to be positive and get a vote in affirmative in assigning the ARPA funds and transferring these funds to the Manhasset sewer project. Thank you, and I'm relieved that I can't be considered for the ethics committee since I'm friends with all of you. It has nothing to do with my ethics, but my friendships are generally in question. Thank you very much.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: However, I could pick you out of a lineup.

MR. DONNO: Thank you very much.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: This is a project that Manhasset residents have been asking for for many years, and this, as you said, Mr. Donno, would benefit everyone around Manhasset Bay, and I'm very proud to move a long-stalled project forward tonight as we allocate these funds. For over 50 years, the residents and businesses along Plandome Road have had to rely on septic tanks, and over time, this has led to numerous issues, like potential impact excess nitrogen flows have on the bay and significant financial burdens on our businesses and health consequences for our children. We even know of a Plandome business that spends over \$70 thousand a year on septic services. So it has been found to be cost prohibitive for businesses looking to open on Plandome Road, and it's time to change. Over the last year, I've had meetings with the various stakeholders, including the Great Neck Water Pollution Control Districts, the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce, my fellow council members, and it's been discussed how this administration can best move this forward as it has stalled for years. So while the details are still being finalized, this project is a high priority for the community and I've long believed that now is the perfect time to address it, especially in light of the \$5 million grant secured by Assemblywoman Sillitti, and I want to thank Assemblywoman Sillitti for your hard work on this project. Allocating a portion of the town's remaining ARPA funds to leverage the existing funds that are in place for the Manhasset Sewer Connection Project will finally push it over the line to completion, and even more importantly, ARPA funds were specifically designed to be utilized for investments and things like water and sewer infrastructure. So this \$3.1 million allocation of funds is the perfect way to finally make this dream a reality. It will promote economic development on Plandome Road, increase the quality of life of our residents and businesses, and most importantly, help protect Manhasset Bay from dangerous nitrogen flow for generations to come. And it's important to note that while we're allocating the funds tonight, this is largely an administrative step to transfer the funds into a dedicated capital account for the project. When the project is finally ready to actually expend the funds, it will come up for a vote once again to authorize the expenditures. And unless anybody else from the public would like to speak at this time, I offer the resolution and move for its adoption.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: How about board members?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You'll get to vote.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I'd like to speak before --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Go ahead.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I've been a supporter of this project for a long time. I know that in the Manhasset Sewer feasibility study by the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, it makes it clear that bringing sewers to Plandome Road has been a recommendation for decades. I read the Town of North Hempstead 1989 Master Plan, 1989, concluded that the lack of sewers on Plandome Road was an environmental constraint for efficient growth of neighborhood

businesses. I also note that a 1999 study from the Manhasset Bay Protection Committee established goals to improve water quality in Manhasset Bay. The study recommended replacing septic tanks and connection to an existing sewer system to achieve nitrogen reductions consistent with the recommendations of the Long Island Sound study. Notwithstanding this, the Manhasset community had great reservations about switching from septic tanks to sewers, fearing that it would bring unwanted development, and I know that Councilwoman Kaplan struggled with a feeling in the community that was not ready yet for sewers. I would like to commend the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce for doing the difficult work and for the greater council of doing the work of educating the public on the need to bring sewers to Manhasset. In the interest of full transparency, I want to discuss a little bit about the history of this project. In June of this year, we had a group meeting with the representatives from the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce, the Town of North Hempstead-Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, and Assemblywoman Sillitti. After that meeting, the attorney from the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District wrote a letter in which he said, that with the \$5 million New York State grant secured by Assemblywoman Sillitti, the district had performed a preliminary financial analysis which indicates that the sum will likely be sufficient to cover the installation of a low pressure sewer main, projected for the commercial section of Plandome Road. So receiving this, I was under the impression and so was Assemblywoman Sillitti, that no additional town funding --and Councilwoman Dalimonte, that no additional funding would be needed from the town. Then in early November, the Supervisor held a press conference to which neither I, nor Councilwoman Dalimonte, was given notice or invited to, announcing her allocation of \$3 million to this project. This really shocked me because of the work that I had been doing on this project and because we are used to being informed of initiatives and projects involving residents in our districts, and that's the way the town is supposed to work. By not giving any information or inviting us, this project was politicized and I hope we can move past that. It's really a shame that the project has become political because the Supervisor chose to break with town practice and fail to discuss with us before approaching the press. My favorite saying, which my husband hates is, it is what it is. So we are here today and what do we do next? So, like I said, it's a good project and the ARPA funds are indeed uniquely suited for a project like this. But there are still many unanswered questions about the project. Councilwoman Dalimonte and I recently wrote a detailed letter which we offered to the Supervisor to sign on to, with a list of questions in anticipation of a meeting that they are scheduling for the beginning of February. The questions relate to the cost of the project overall because the feasibility study that we're working with right now is from 2020, and so this \$3 million dollars is based on numbers from 2020. There's questions about the funding of the project, if the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District doesn't get enough funding, who is going to fund the project to finish it? How is it going to be done? There is questions about the costs to businesses to connect. It's still not clear to me whether or not this money is going to that spur connection, which you mentioned, Robbie, or if it's going to something else. There's a question about ongoing connection costs. Right now, as contemplated by the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, each connecting property will be paying two times the assessed value in perpetuity, which the town staff has made a calculation and said, that is just not financially responsible for us to do, there has to be a renegotiation of that cost going forward. I also am worried that by doing this project in this manner, there's going to be difficulty to connect to the residential sewers, because that is the ultimate goal. The ultimate goal here, in my mind, I mean we have to think we can't, you know, think so big that we can't get anything done, but the ultimate goal would be to sewer all of Manhasset. So, thank you for

listening to me, I know I just put a lot out there. But in sum, I know the project is important and I really am hopeful that we can move it forward, but I don't think we are at the position to allocate funds right now. I would like to suggest that we table the item to a date, which means it stays on the agenda, after the upcoming meeting with the sewer district. This are hopefully give us the information we need, it will allow us to fine tune the \$3 million number, because right now that number is \$3 million. Right now that number is based on a 2020 feasibility study, and it will allow us as town board members to make a responsible decision about the use of these ARPA funds. Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: So you're asking to table it?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: So you want to kill the project?

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Wait a second, did I --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I'm just going to address some of the things.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Actually, just to make it clear, I thought I said multiple times that I am supportive of this project, I want to move it forward, so I would like to move to postpone it to March 14th, and I don't see how a project --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Unbelievable.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: -- that has been -- I don't understand why today it has to be done, why we have to allocate the money today. Why can't we wait a few weeks until we figure out what the right number is?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We don't know to know the right number, we need to show our commitment to the project. Now, did you ask Assemblywoman Sillitti?

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Is that a quote, you don't need to know the right number? Do you hear yourself?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Really, you're going to interrupt me now when I'm making my comments?

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: You interrupted everyone else.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: And by the way, you said you wanted to table it. That's not pushing it forward to another date, because the problem with tabling it is, then it takes four people to untable it.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It takes the majority to untable it.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It's a majority to untable it.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Okay, postpone it.

MR. DONNO: May I respond for a second?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Robbie would like to respond.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Let me respond to Councilman Walsh. Point taken. Postpone it so that it continues to be in the Supervisor's control.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Which is completely different than tabling it.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Yeah, yeah, so I change -- I take your point, I would move to

postpone it to March 14th.

MR. DONNO: In 1989, I had dark hair.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We're Still listening to the public. I just want you to say there's no motion on the floor, we're still listening to the public. Thank you, thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I would propose.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Go ahead.

MR. DONNO: Okay, first of all, the feasibility study that you mentioned has the -- we worked with the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, and there's a lot more work that went into it than my three-minute presentation.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: It's right here.

MR. DONNO: I got it, I understand that, hold on a second. That feasibility study and what we're actually doing is entirely different. Because we had to take into consideration some of the concerns that Senator Kaplan had, the price tags that you saw in there were like \$16 million, or \$24 million, could have supported development that is unwanted in the Manhasset community, and we were cognizant of that. So they redesigned it so there is a pump system and a smaller pipe system, and it's going to disrupt the actual installation of this, is going to be less disruptive than what the original project, the feasibility study had outlined. So the cost has come way down. Second of all, in terms of anybody worrying about what it's going to cost each individual business, in this particular case we're talking about Plandome Road and the business area of Plandome Road. Because the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District is dealing directly with the business owners and the property owners, they'll be able to determine whether this is economically feasible for them or not. So when we ran the numbers for places like Louie's, the savings to that restaurant are astronomical, the savings to Villa Milano is astronomical. It may not be for everybody, and the concern that we had in terms of the cost of the spurs coming in, is that if we don't do that now and property ownership changes, down the road the next property owner -- I want to build it up, then you got to tear the road up again. So your small dollars is investing -- is encouraging everybody to participate. So this was a well thought out plan. In terms of the residences, the format and the template that we ended up coming up with, we didn't go into this knowing that, but our work and our research and the hiring of some expert lawyers managed to have to come up with this template where once you do go to the residences, the same thing can occur. A resident can make up their mind whether they're gonna actually hook up and go to the expense of bringing it into their property and whether it's worthwhile or not without having it be attached by some entity. It's a user fee; it's like Uber. You want to take a drive, you gotta pay the freight.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Donno, can I ask you a question?

MR. DONNO: Sure, go ahead. How you doing?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm doing great.

MR. DONNO: Good.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Thank you for asking; how are you doing? I wish I had your hair.

MR. DONNO: You want some?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Yes. So who would pay -- if a property owner later on, you know, after this is installed, if a property owner -- if a current property owner decides not to hook up to the sewer system, and then later, ten years from now, five years from now, a new property owner decide they want to hook up. Would they been able to do that?

MR. DONNO: Yes. The ARPA funds, so that we're clear, that we're both speaking the same language. The reason why we don't put the spurs in to everybody right now is to avoid some property owner ten years from now wanting to come in there and then having to build the spur into their property line. What happens from the property line to their, you know, their source, their toilets --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: This is helpful for me, you would put the spurs in now --

MR. DONNO: The spur makes it accessible to everybody now.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: --to every property, whether they decide to do the last ten feet, whatever it is, to hook up their sewage system.

MR. DONNO: Right, to their sewage system, right.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And so --

MR. DONNO: We are actually contemplating, so you know, and that's not for a decision that this board needs to deal with. The Chamber of Commerce is contemplating organizing the actual hook ups so that we can buy the pumps in bulk, so we could get one plumbing company to do the work so that we leverage the amount of work and bulk buying, for lack of a better expression, to give our businesses the best break they can. And this is also in terms of the Manhasset community. All of these people, it's not only Manhasset, these businesses are taking a beating the last couple of years, so this is a good investment for everything. The minute that that pipe goes in the ground from the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, the property values will increase. It will decrease the time that it takes for a new business to come in and establish itself in particular if they are a food establishment. So a Carvel that took two-and-a-half years, three years, part of that length of time, I know the Building Department gets its share of blame, but the other piece of that is that they have to get a permit from Nassau County to install a septic system, and these things are getting more and more expensive and it's coming under more and more scrutiny, for all the reasons that we need to put a sewer system in. If we don't do this now and we can form this template, then it can go to the other communities. So the work we did was groundbreaking and paves the way for other communities to do this, and frankly, I don't want to be the guy championing that because I have another -- because I have other fish that I want to fry, you know.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Because this --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- sorry --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Oh, go ahead.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm Still in the learning phase, so pardon me. The -- does the -- obviously the road has to be dug up in order to do all this work.

MR. DONNO: Right.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Is that true of the sidewalks as well?

MR. DONNO: The way I understand it, and I do think that there's gotta be some clarification, that the smaller pipe systems may end up going under one of the sidewalks and knock down the center of the road, so when -- my comment on that part of the it being less disruptive, if you had a gravity system, the pipes are this big and you put them down in the middle of the road and now you gotta tear everything up and it disrupts everything, these pipes are much smaller and it's a pump system that pumps the -- that moves the sludge, you know, down the line into the --to its final destination, Great Neck.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So then is your answer about my question about whether or not the sidewalks have to be disrupted, that we don't know enough yet?

MR. DONNO: Yes, you know, I'm not the engineer and I didn't do the plan. So I -- I'm not -- I haven't gotten that answer.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Let me just ask this, okay. Assemblywoman Sillitti gave \$5 million and at some point somebody thought that was enough. Now the Supervisor's put forward a resolution to put another \$3.1 million in, and I'm not sure that we know that's enough. Let me ask you, with the \$5 million and the three \$3.1 million, does that cover the cost of repairing any sidewalks that have to be fixed, if, in fact, that's the technology that that's used?

MR. DONNO: There's two answers to that, and the one answer is, specifically, I don't know. I'm not the engineer and I haven't got the fine pencil point. Globally, I think it's going to be more than enough and I think that that's why I'm -- so, to the extent that it's approved tonight, you know, that would cover us and we're done, and then we're really rocking and rolling.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Except that, and I want to thank you for being honest, your two answers you gave, the first was, I don't know, right, and that's being honest.

MR. DONNO: That's a precision question. If I had known I would have had an engineer here.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So, Mr. Donno --

MR. DONNO: And I think to that point, those answers are going to be given to us.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I think you were here, actually, the night that we voted unanimously.

MR. DONNO: You mean you forgot when I was here? I'm crushed.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: You're a frequent visitor, so. That night, the seven of us crossed political lines, we've heard some comment about that. We, the seven of us, voted to put \$2 million of the ARPA money toward a project to do sidewalks in Carle Place --

MR. DONNO: Yes, I was here.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And at the time of the vote, Councilman Walsh gave that one of his reasons for voting for it, and he was excited about it and understandably so, was that it was a shovel-ready project, that we were ready to start. The county was ready to start, the town was ready to start. By your own admission, that doesn't seem to be the case on this project. By the Supervisor's own admission, that doesn't --please let me finish -- that doesn't seem to be the case with this project. You said you don't know that -- if this additional \$3 million will cover the cost of repairing sidewalks if that needs to be done. The Supervisor has said that the details are to come. I've got concerns about that, because I know, Mr. Donno, and you're -- - you've been around a long time and you know --

MR. DONNO: Wait a second, back off of that.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: You know that once this money, \$3 million, goes into that pot, it's never coming out.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: That's untrue.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Let me just finish, please.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Well don't say things that are false.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: In my estimation, and you're an experienced guy, you know and I know, the Supervisor may not agree, once that money goes in, it's never coming out, and so -- let me finish, please --

MR. DONNO: I don't know that either.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- let me finish. If we leave this open ended, to give the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District unlimited time to get answers to the questions that Councilwoman Lurvey and Councilwoman Dalimonte asked and that you, yourself, can't answer tonight, that if we give them unlimited time to respond, we may not get answers for two more years. People look at this ARPA money as being a windfall, it's like, we've got \$10 million and so we're freed, this is great, we'll just put it to the side for a year or a month, I don't know what it's going to be, and you can't tell me either, I don't think, but it's not. We have needs --

MR. DONNO: What I will tell you is.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Please let me get my nice soliloquy over, okay, then you can go again. We've got unlimited need for money in the Town of North Hempstead, for all kinds of projects. In my estimation, it would be unfair to take \$3 million, a third of the total money that we're being given, and put it -- designate it for a project without asking the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District to say we're going to come back with answers to questions like mine in a specific timeframe so that we know that when we vote to put the money in, that the questions that are asked in this letter, questions that I've asked you can be addressed. So we're not just putting the money away never to be seen again by other projects throughout the town. And so, you know, Councilwoman Lurvey has proposed that we set a date specific for tabling this item, to give the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District time to respond to these questions. We can, by March 14th, if they answer these questions, we can fairly say that yes, we will put that money away because we know it's going to be put to good use.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I'd like to also just add that the sewer district has asked us for a meeting for the week of February 6th, so that's why we would not put it on for February 7th, that's why I'm assuming you picked March 14th --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Exactly.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: -- because we don't know when that we -- the sewer district had called for a meeting with the Supervisor, Assemblywoman Sillitti, Councilwoman Lurvey and myself, and I believe Manhasset Chamber of Commerce, so that's why -- that's also -- we should really wait for that meeting to hear what they have to say.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Yes, so we've heard how long this project has waited. To ask to wait not even two months more, I don't think is a big ask.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It's been many years and this letter that was sent out under the signatures and photographs of Councilwoman Dalimonte, it's not your district so I'm not sure why you're on it --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Because I represent --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It's not your district.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I represent residents in Manhasset that use Plandome Road.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: This is a plan --let me finish. This letter went out asking for information and the letters just keep coming. You have received information for years, you've been having meetings and asking for information for years, so why would we think that two months is going to make a difference? You sent this letter out even though I said let's not send it, let's have a meeting so we see what we have and what we still need to do so we don't stretch this timetable too long, because we will lose that capacity at the Great Neck Water Treatment plant. This has been a long time of waiting.

MR. DONNO: I would like to - - if I can make one more comment.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Robbie, can I just answer? The letter that I wrote, I asked Councilwoman Dalimonte to sign onto it, as well as yourself, Supervisor, I asked you both

SUPERVISOR DESENA: And I ask that we not send it so we have a meeting, which I thought would be more productive.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I disagreed because I think if the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District gets a list of the questions and they can have them at the meeting and we can have a discussion at the meeting and get the -- you know, have the answers; right? But I asked Councilwoman Dalimonte to sign on with me because she represents many residence in Manhasset as well, so, thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Thank you for being a team player.

MR. DONNO: If I may, I am ultimately confident that the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District not only has those answers, most of them have been answered already, and most of them are not going to end up being in your purview because, you know, we're dealing directly with the businesses and that's the way it was structured. Int terms of worrying what it's going to cost people, they're going to make their own determination, which is what I really like about that was a bonus that I didn't anticipate. The individual businessowner is going to sit down with that formula and he's going to say, this is good for me or it's not going to be good for me. All you have to do is get this purse to the property, and that's what this ARPA money is for. If it's another month, frankly, I think that this board has got to get together and vote unanimously, not abstain, not have arguments. This is something that's good for everybody, because this business that goes back and forth, I love all you people but if I had to sit in that chair it'd be a root canal, it's like root canal. It's painful. And if I were you, any one of you, I'd be sitting there going, I support this because it helps Democrats and Republicans.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I support it.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You're going to vote yes --

MR. DONNO: And the other thing --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: -- then vote yes.

MR. DONNO: -- and the other thing is

SUPERVISOR DESENA: So let's vote.

MR. DONNO: Can you imagine what you could do with this if you were a cartoon --a political cartoonist; Manhasset Bay?

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Mr. Donno --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So --

MR. DONNO: I think we need your support.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Mr. Donno, I have a question --

MR. DONNO: You can call me Robbie, because I'm not going to be on the ethics committee.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: When you said the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District is going to be dealing with the businesses, okay, and they are going to be telling them how much the fee is. So if we spend \$8 million, \$5 million from the State, \$3.1, so it's really, like, \$9 million --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It's not nine, it's 8.1.

MR. DONNO: It's 8.1.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I'm sorry, 8.1, sorry, sorry, sorry, 8.1, sorry about that, 8.1. So basically if we could be spending that much money on taxpayers money from the State and from the town, but should we know how many people might sign up? Because you don't want it just to be -- you spent \$8.1 million and only five people signed up because of the cost.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You're not listening to the constituents.

MR. DONNO: You're going to have a lot of people signing up because the numbers are astronomical in what they're going to save. And sitting here from the Manhasset Chamber of Commerce, we've done the numbers, we went to the storeowners. Louie's --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Not a restaurant, like, a jewelry store or a real estate office.

MR. DONNO: Those jewelry stores and offices and whatnot are generally owned by a landlord who would probably put that in because it's a better use than having a cesspool. It's about land use.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It's 2023, and you have --

MR. DONNO: The likelihood of nobody signing up --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It's ridiculous, it's ridiculous --

MR. DONNO: It's ridiculous.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I actually have some information --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You know, I wonder if I can burst in here a little bit. It's 2023, and

we hear before that in 1989, this was looked at and recommended. It's 2023 and to think that Manhasset doesn't have sewers is, you know, the pollution just continues and continues and continues as we continue to talk.

MR. DONNO: I told my friends of my involvement in this, okay, from all over the country. I was on a Zoom call tonight with the Gift of Life for people in other countries and they go, you don't have sewers? I mean, it's ridiculous. People from Jordan, Philippines.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: There are areas in Port Washington that don't have sewers either.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: And Great Neck, also, and that's the Supervisor's point.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: And so that's what it's about, that's what it's about, it's about taking the money to somewhere else.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: No.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: No, not at all.

MR. DONNO: This is as close to being ready to -- all you have to do is give it your blessing and it's gonna get done.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Donno, can I just tell you, you've live with this for a long time, we've heard --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: They're going to run out of capacity, that's why we have to get this project done. Why does everybody read the worst -- I'm sorry.

MR. DONNO: I don't believe --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Donno, Mr. Donno, we've had -- I'm new to this, okay, and so I'm learning and I actually spoke to the former deputy assessor of Nassau County to ask him, like, what would be the impact on property values from installing a sewer system? And I really didn't know the answer, because I was concerned with whether or not individual property owners would want to spend -- and I was hearing estimates, like, of \$100,000 to hook up to the spur, and I don't know if that's true or not, but -- you don't have to answer. That's part of my problem with voting on this tonight, but he confirmed, like you've said, that property values will go up because property owners have to spend so much money on having their septic tank cleared, and I know, and Mr. McDonough is in the back, I know that when I was the Director of Operations here, he actually -- I know he threatened, he may have actually closed down part of the town's building across the street because the septic tank had gotten filled up and the smell was so bad it was causing a safety issue. So I fully support this project.

MR. DONNO: When you have a chance --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Let me, please, because I'm on my little thing here, don't interrupt me; right, you'll have your chance again because you have not been timed out by anybody here.

MR. DONNO: I appreciate that, thank you.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But I want you to know, you're having good effect because as I thought about this, I was like, \$3 million is a lot of money to spend on a relatively small strip of the town when you consider the entirety of the town, but you've educated me tonight by telling me it impacts the bay. I'm even more inclined now to vote for this if I wasn't inclined before.

But, and I think you've acknowledged that, not everybody here agrees, but asking for less than 60 days more to get some solid answers to questions asked here is really, I can only, I think, serve to make this project even better than what it is now.

MR. DONNO: I think you're going to support it anyhow --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm sorry?

MR. DONNO: I think you're going to support it anyhow. When you talk to your friend at Nassau County, ask him, you know, what their rate is because the formula that we have is exactly the same thing as if we had --if we were going to hook up to Nassau County sewer system. It's a longer ride but it's --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And just so you know, this may scare someone, he referred to the ongoing cost after you've hooked -- the property owner is hooked up, as a tax, which can be a dirty word, but there's going to be an ongoing cost as well, which we don't know yet what that is.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Except, Robert, we do know that for town hall we have the numbers and the numbers have been run, because we want to connect town hall, right, this building and the building over there, and we're actually putting off work on the septic so we had been in order to connect. So we're waiting for this project. The cost, the ongoing cost would pay off the equalization fee in ten years, and I'm talking now about, you know, throwing out terms that a lot of people aren't going to know about - -

MR. DONNO: Right.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: -- but the conclusion was that the town would have to pay much more than its fair share and so that formula of that two times the assessed value is too high.

MR. DONNO: The formula is the same in Nassau County. Check it. That's what I was asking him to do. That's the standard formula. The other thing --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Can I ask Mr. Pollack to come out and explain the formula, please?

MR. MARONEY: I don't think you need them to explain it to all of us. You should have your meeting.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I agree.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I know, right, why are we going into this?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I think all of this reinforces the point that --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, it doesn't.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- there's still information to be had --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: And we should wait for the meeting.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: We can't do it tonight, we're not gonna --

MR. MARONEY: I agree, that's what I'm saying. I'm not trying to jump in, but honestly --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Sir, you can't speak from there.

MR. MARONEY: Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Come on up.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, no, he --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: You can come on up.

MR. DONNO: Thank you very much.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Thank you, Steve.

MR. MARONEY: You all seem to be --

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Wait, you have to --

MR. MARONEY: Matt Maroney. You guys all seem to basically say, this is not something I'm against, it's been waiting since Christ was a corporal, but you're asking to wait a couple more months to fill in some things that could be a big deal, and I can only say the frustration of a taxpayer, who is an independent businessowner, is only government elected officials seem to poo poo whether it's \$9 million -- no, it's \$8.1 million, not \$9 million. Why wait? Let's get it done now. It's very easy to spend everyone else's money. Get the numbers before you do it because we all know every government project, it's probably going to be \$18 million by the end of the day.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Let me just --I'm going to put a little background on this. My proposal tonight is to put it in a fund that is available for this project.

MR. MARONEY: I understood that, and I agree.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We're not spending it, but I keep hearing -- I've been hearing it's not enough money, it's too much money, we're not sure if we want to spend it on that. There's other things in the town that we have to spend money on. We're not voting on spending the money tonight. We're only --

MR. MARONEY: I understand that, I got that, too --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Right, but I'm not sure if my colleagues do.

MR. MARONEY: -- but I also agree to the point that once it goes in, it never comes

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Well, they happen to have a majority of this board and they do control decisions like that. So we're asking it to be put in -- dedicated to the project so that we move forward, because, really, nothing is going to change in two months, it's just going to be another letter.

MR. MARONEY: What's the difference if they dedicate it in two months instead of now?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It will just be another letter in two months saying we need more information in two months, and there's another reason --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I think if we do the work, we can get a lot of information in two months, especially since we already sent the letter, so they're already working on the numbers.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: There's another reason why this is the on the agenda tonight, and that is because, yes, I proposed this a few months ago along with an infrastructure project in

Carle Place that Councilman Troiano agreed to in his district, a large infrastructure project in Councilwoman Dalimonte's district, and then this one in Manhasset. It seemed spread throughout. This is only ARPA money we're talking about, which is limited to infrastructure -- I'm saying, there are restrictions on how you can use it. You can't just use it on, you know, operating costs, it has to be -- it is supposed to be for infrastructure plans like this one. Those three plans were submitted to the Federal Government for approval and I announced them. Subsequently, the town board majority composed a list of what they would like to spend the ARPA money on, instead, small projects spread throughout their districts, but other small projects, not of this size and importance, and so in a spirit of collaboration, I said, yes, let's put those in our capital plan. Every one of the items that they wanted to spend the ARPA money plan, we put into the capital plan at the amount that they requested and we're voting on that tonight. That's why it was very important to me that we kind of stay with out agreement that I put their capital projects in the capital plan and that we dedicate this ARPA money to a very large program that benefits businesses and the environment, so that is why it is important that we vote on this tonight.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I didn't have an agreement with you, but I support the sewer project, but that's the first I'm hearing of this agreement.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: We put all of your plans into the capital plan and we are voting on them in a few more resolutions.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I didn't submit any plans to the capital plan.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You all --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Can I please finish because you made a comment, let me finish. It gives the impression that I and others had some pet project that we wanted to get done and you were gracious enough to put it. That's not, in fact, the case at all. Yes, there are projects that are going to be done in my district, but I didn't ask for them. The people that asked for them are the people that work for this town, for the Parks Department and other departments, that they decided they're the ones that decided that those projects should be done. Let's not act like you put something in a capital plan that gets done, because you were a part of the capital plan hearing when it came to light that a project in my district was in the capital plan in 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, and now 2023. So let's, please, don't give anybody here the impression that I've got a pet project, and that if I did, that means it gets done right away, because it doesn't. It just means it gets into the plan and maybe somebody will get around to it someday.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: In any event --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Nobody is disagreeing with anything you've said, all we said is, just give us less than 60 days to let the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, who is going to run this project, give us answers to some very legitimate questions. Why we have to debate all this time, almost 60 days, whether or not we can wait to get the definitive answers from them.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: And we can allocate the money in a fund --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: And it will never come out.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: -- excuse me.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: As a Supervisor who comes from Manhasset --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You know that's false, Robert. You know that's false.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- she is never -- I wouldn't even want to -- if I were you, I wouldn't even want to put yourself in that position. Living in Manhasset, taking a vote to actually take the money out of a project from Manhasset is never going to happen politically.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: This is something for the residents.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: That's not democratic republic of politics.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You keep talking, you gotta let her speak, too, once in a while.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I can be allowed to finish my thoughts, then she can speak.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Well, you finished your thought I thought.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What I know is that when Assemblywoman Sillitti had the big check, we all went out there and we stood there and took the pictures with the big check and we told the community that we're listening to you, we know you really want this project. Your elected representatives are here, they said they really wanted this project. Why wasn't Assemblywoman Sillitti asked, well, wait a minute, what are the details, we need two more months? You know, you accepted that and we all want to do this project. That's why if you want to do the project, you will make this commitment.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I want to do the project so much that I want it to work. In all my years as a corporate lawyer negotiating a large infrastructure project, I know that you can get close to the finish line and then the project falls apart. I think we need a little bit more information. We have a meeting scheduled -- we're scheduling a meeting for one of the first two weeks in February, and I think it would be reckless to allocate this funding without the information.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Can I make a comment, if you don't mind? I'll make this comment to you in reaction to the Supervisor's comment.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Thank you, Mr. Pollack [sic].

MR. DONNO: Do I look like I'm reckless?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Your in my indirect way of talking to the Supervisor.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What did you say, why don't you tell all of us?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm happy to - -

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Why don't you tell all of us?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Why don't you tell all of us, how come you whispered over here and you didn't speak to me?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I am trying to tell everybody what I asked him; okay? Give me a chance to tell you.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Why doesn't he tell us? What is he telling you for?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Give me a chance, I'm trying to tell you now.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I see what's going on here.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Donno, Mr. Donno. Mr. Donno?

MR. DONNO: Yes?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So the Supervisor pointed out that some of us, not me, apparently came to a photo op with Assemblywoman Sillitti, celebrating the \$5 million that was gotten for this project, and we want to congratulate Assemblywoman Sillitti, but I want you to know that, at the same time, a letter was received from the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, saying that the \$5 million secured by Assemblywoman Sillitti was enough, sufficient. So now we get -- we hear, oh, that's what I was asking Mitch about, Mr. Pitnick about. So now we're here, oh, no, \$5 million is not sufficient, we need \$3 million more. So, still, I'm back to, what is wrong with waiting to find out if maybe \$3 million isn't sufficient? Maybe we need another two beyond that.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: So let's not do it.

MR. DONNO: I'd like to answer that. In the first place, and the first place, some of us knew that there was going to be more than the \$5 million needed and we were --we were -- excuse me, we were celebrating, popping the champagne corks because it was down from \$16 million to \$24 million, was the range of the feasibility study indicated. I have a question that may help this process.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Before you move on, though, okay, because I just made the point that --

MR. DONNO: I thought I had the floor.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I though you did too.

MR. DONNO: I have a train of thought, so I'd like to finish it. The question comes in, and I'm sitting here, I'm not a town council person or a lawyer or anything else, I'm sitting here listening to resolutions about spending money on copy paper, on water coolers, on office supplies and stuff like that, you know. If you're going to sit here tonight and you actually voted to transfer this fund -- these funds to be designated for use for the sewer district, at some point in time there's going to be an expenditure that's going to be needed that's going to be requested. Is the process gonna be the same, that there's going to be a resolution put in front of the town board for the actual payment of doing whatever it is that they -- you know, the storage or --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I see you're looking at me, you want an answer. I don't know, but Supervisor DeSena said there would be another resolution to actually spend the money. So I assume that's correct.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What we're doing tonight is just putting it in a fund and then the actual spending of it happens when it --as you described.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Mr. Donno, my issue is, once you put it in it's not coming out, but can we just go back to the cost of this?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You got the four votes .

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Can I go back to my original point, which was that we had a letter from the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District, and it said that --

MR. DONNO: You can look at your notes, it's okay.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- that said \$5 million was enough, and you said, oh, we all knew it wasn't -- that that wasn't enough, but -- hold on, but they put in writing to us that it was enough. And so what am I to do about that? I need more answers.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: You know what the problem is, not your problem, it's not anybody's problem up here, it's really -- the solution that was created to get around the equalization fee, which is creative and great, right, and I really hope it works because, you know, we really want this project to happen, it doesn't involve public hearings and doesn't involve a referendum and it doesn't provide with a process through which we can all get the information needed in a transparent way. If we had -- if the sewer district had expanded according to state law, then there would be --

MR. DONNO: No, it is as according to state law, that's incorrect. It's according to state law.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: But they're not expanding the sewer district, they're contracting out.

MR. DONNO: Right, it's lawful. Don't characterize it as being unlawful.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I'm not saying it's unlawful, no, no, no, no.

MR. DONNO: I'll never get a shot at the ethics committee if you do that.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I'm saying that if we had gone through the process that's in state law, right, there would have been periods of time when the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District would have to give information to everybody and to the town board. We're going in a different process now to avoid the equalization fee, to make this feasible. I think that's why up here, we don't have the information and it's not fair to ask you about the information because you're not the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District.

MR. DONNO: That's right, I'm elected to say things that I think are true but I can't represent that. I'm going to give you a personal opinion, and one of the things that I feel very good about, the efforts that we put in there, is that we didn't leave it to a governmental body. And you have seen in this country some pushback on government. People don't trust it, and the actions of what goes on here, in Albany and in Washington, D.C., doesn't do much to instill confidence in the electorate and what our public officials are doing. It appears to us all the time that people are playing games. Somebody got up here before and mentioned "the other side." To me, the world is round, there are no sides, the sides are us. When I sit there and I talk about this year, and I'm really excited, I'll share this with you, that the conference call that I had is contemplating providing heart surgery for 5,000 kids this year, and we're going to cross a threshold of 50,000 all over the world. People who would otherwise identify themselves as Republicans and Democrats, or this and that, by color, by whatnot, are all working together. One of the things that I would love to see, and I was going to tongue-in-cheek say that I would like to be the guy that has this board unanimously vote for this project because it's good for the people. When I sit there and I mention Kings Point and Sands Point and all of those communities, you know, there are people behind there. There are kids that are playing on the beaches, there are people that are going in the water, there is business development, our shorelines are a gem. So, to me, I would not want to be a council person voting against this. To me I would be aggressive and I would set the money aside. To me, I would not want to be criticized for not doing everything I could and putting it all out, and that's my nature. I can only tell you what I would do because I'm a hundred percent in, and that's the way I run my life. It's all or nothing. I would encourage you

to do this. What was terminology used? Your husband said whatever it is it is --

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: It is what it is.

MR. DONNO: It is what it is. I would encourage you to make a commitment to this tonight. Show me that you're committed. Show me. I really appreciate, you've given me an inordinate amount of time, I really appreciate that and I'll see you next time.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: The information that we're looking for in this letter is not needed to show our commitment, so - - and it is not going to be spent and this majority can move that in the future as everyone can see. So, with that, I offer the resolution and move for its adoption.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I need help from the town attorney on this. Is it possible now, given that the resolution has been called as it is, to now make a motion to table until March 14th? I know we had a big --

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: No, to postpone.

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: To postpone, don't table it.

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: We talked about before, not tabling, but postponing.

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: Till after the sewer main.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm not sure what the proper --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I called the motion.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: She called the motion; right?

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: She asked that earlier, before the motion.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, she didn't, she didn't make a motion. She said that.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I'm curious as to what -- I didn't hear you, Councilman.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Let's vote. We've heard from our residents, let's vote.

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: I suggested we move to postpone to a date certain.

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: She did say that.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: And she said it wasn't a motion, she suggested it.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Doesn't the second motion get called first before the first motion?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Unbelievable, this is unbelievable.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Counsel --

MR. CHIARA: The issue is that -- did you make a motion?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, and I had her clarify. She did not make a motion.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Councilwoman Lurvey, did you make a motion?

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: I didn't actually make a motion, and I clarified that I was just

saying that I suggested postponing.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: I just want to make sure that -- you know, I just feel like there's these questions. I am for the project.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Then vote.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Then vote.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Excuse me, but I am not reckless. I do the -- I'd like to have the -- I want to hear from the sewer district. First I heard \$5 million was okay, then I was, like, okay, we don't need any money. Now I'm hearing three, but I want to hear this number from the sewer district.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: This specific number doesn't matter.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: Yes, it does, yes, it does.

MR. MARONEY: Begin with the end in mind, begin with the end in mind. Get the information before you vote.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I make a motion to postpone --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Excuse me, don't interrupt.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: If they come to us and they say, 2.5 is it, okay, then we do the other resolution for 2.5.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, no, then the other .5 remains in the account and we spend it on something else someday.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Don't we have a motion on the floor?

MR. DONNO: Do you have the letter? Do you have the letter?

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Go ahead.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Excuse me, maybe counsel can help here.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Town Clerk, please call the roll.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: No, wait a second, let's get an answer from the town attorney.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We have a motion on the floor.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Town Clerk, please call the roll.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: If Councilman Troiano or Councilwoman Lurvey make a motion

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: They didn't make a motion.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: --if they make a motion now to continue.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I make a motion to postpone until March --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: There's already a motion on the floor.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: My motion is pending.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: March --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: You gotta speak up, counsel.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Town clerk -- the Town Clerk already started calling the roll.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We already have a motion on the floor --

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: March 14th, 2023.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Let's take the votes first and then -- right?

MR. CHIARA: Yes, Councilman, but they already started calling the roll.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: That's right. So let's go with it.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I want to, I guess I need to strike a middle ground here.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Yes or no, it's a vote.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Let's take a recess.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No recess, are you kidding me? Are you actually kidding me?

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: You know something, Supervisor, when you say it, it's great. But if anyone else on this dais except for Councilman Walsh says anything, it's --the world is coming to an end, the dog ate my homework, anything.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Now this guy is involving me. And by the way, I have to go to the bathroom, so I'd like to get this on the way. Let's get rolling here.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Continue with the vote.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: There's a vote here.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: So you would support a motion?

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No, after we vote --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Councilman Troiano.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: -- I want to vote first.

(Audience participation.)

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm sorry, sir, if you want to say something, please come to the mic.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Sure, sure, Robbie

MR. CHIARA: Whoa, whoa, whoa, okay, now we're in --

COUNCILMAN WALSH: No, no, no, you can't speak.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: We're in a motion.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: You are right, I am mistaken, I'm sorry.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: We're in the process of --

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: But he could be please be asked not to speak out like that. Thank you.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'm sorry.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: This is a clearly a very important vote and I'm going to have to find a middle ground here. I would have liked not to have had to vote this because I don't think this project is quite ready yet, and so I've said numerous times, I think we need to have more time to get all the information before we decide to commit this money into a fund where we will, in estimation, will never come out. I don't want to -- you know, Mr. Donno is proposing vote for it to show our commitment to this project. I don't need to vote for to show my commitment to this project. I've got a commitment to this project, but I've got to make sure that the numbers are right and that people are going to buy into this project, the property owners. But -- so I'm not inclined to vote for it, but I don't want a no-vote to give the opposite representation, Mr. Donno, that I'm not committed to doing this project, so I've got to find a middle ground now, and I hate abstentions --

MR. MARONEY: You just said on the record you are for it, so you don't have to worry about it.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Shh, please.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: You can't speak from the audience.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- I hate abstentions because they're mealy-mouthed, but for the reasons I've stated, I can neither vote yes and I cannot vote no, so I am going to vote to abstain.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Abstain is no.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: No, it's not. It means it has a chance for it to come up again --

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: -- probably on March 14th, and I'll have an opportunity to vote then with a full slate, with a full portfolio of information.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Zuckerman.

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: For the reasons elaborated by the Councilman Troiano, I will abstain.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Walsh.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Absolutely, yes. Manhasset needs sewers.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Lurvey.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: I am really upset because we could have postponed this to the March meeting. We could have collected information and done work between now and then, and we could have been in a place where we could have made a much more informed decision and move this project forward. Instead, we're going to be in a position where, I bet you tomorrow, there's going to be an announcement, there's going to be a press release, "Democrats block sewers in Manhasset"

SUPERVISOR DESENA: The people deserve to know.

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: -- which really could not be farther from the truth.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: The press is here, thank you.

COUNCIL WOMAN LURVEY: I am doing everything that I can to move this project forward in a responsible way, and I hope that all of you who have heard me speak know that I come at this trying to get this project done. Those of you who have worked with me know that that's how I approach government, so I'm really upset that we did not postpone and that I am forced to abstain.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilman Adhami.

COUNCILMAN ADHAMI: Aye.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Councilwoman Dalimonte.

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: I am for this project, but I also do my research, and I would like to know from the sewer district, exactly the amount of money that we should be taking from all the Town of North Hempstead resident's ARPA funds to put in. That is very important to me. When we know that, I will vote yes for that, but right now I am abstaining until I have that number, and I ask, Councilwoman Lurvey, I ask you to put it back on the agenda for March 14th. We are having a meeting with the sewer district the week of February 6th. We've all sent our information to them, we are waiting for them, but I also ask you, Councilwoman Lurvey, because I know that you would do your due diligence, to please ask the Great Neck Water Pollution Control District to be here at that meeting. I really -- I think that's very, very important for anyone that has questions, that it's there. So I abstain, but I want the Manhasset community to know and the press to know that I am for this project. Thank you.

CLERK SRIVASTAVA: Supervisor DeSena.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: It's only --you're only for the project if you vote yes for it, and that's very clear.

COUNCIL WOMAN DALIMONTE: I will.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: No, but the motion is right now, if you're for the project, you vote yes for it. Just like we supported the oysters going into the bay, we all want clean water and we all owed our residents this tonight. We did not owe them politics and excuses. We owed them infrastructure project. This was a gift from the Federal Government, this ARPA money, and we owed it for this long-waiting, important project for our businesses and our environment. I vote yes.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'd like to make a motion to reconsider the previous resolution.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Thank you, Mr. Pitnick, for bringing that up.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What is that?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: It looks like there's four, five, six, or seven or eight of these guys working in the hallway to help out over there.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What is this?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: I think we see what's going on.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: I don't understand, motion to reconsider what?

MR. CHIARA: A motion to reconsider a vote may be made only during the same meeting or which the vote proposed be considered was taken. A motion to reconsider may be made in any order of business. This section shall not be deemed to limit the authority of the town board. I guess the motion to reconsider is you want to do a revote on it; is that right?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: Yes, but let me ask you, can I then make a motion to postpone consideration until March 14th?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Let's ask Mr. Pitnick.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Please, Town Attorney, please, can you let us have a vote that stands? Now we're going to erase it --

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Supervisor, let him answer the question.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: -- because you think it doesn't look good for the press, so you're going to erase what you just did?

COUNCILMAN ZUCKERMAN: Allow counsel to answer the question.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Let's just get Mr. Pitnick to answer his question. Nobody is paying attention to me, he seems to know what's going on over there.

MR. CHIARA: With all due respect, it's my job so answer the questions.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Yeah, thank you.

MR. CHIARA: The town board's rules allow you to do a motion to reconsider and then you're allowed to make a motion on the subsequent resolution.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: What is the purpose of this, what is the purpose of the motion to reconsider?

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: So he's going to put it on the agenda on March 14th.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You think that you - -

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Oh, hold on, here we go again.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: -- and then it doesn't count?

COUNCILMAN WALSH: Can we hear from you at the microphone, because you seem to be whispering over here. I'd like to know what this guy is telling him. You see what's going on over here? I'd like to know what's going on with the shadow government over here, because he's whispering over there and I don't have privilege to this. I think people see what's going on around here, huh?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I would -- I'm sorry, Mr. Town Attorney, I would ask you again, because I want to make sure that we're -- this is an important matter, and if you, want, we can take a motion to go to recess for you to reconsider this, but I would like to confirm that if we make a motion to reconsider the previous resolution and it passes, that we can then make a motion to postpone further consideration until March 14th?

MR. CHIARA: I don't see why you couldn't. There's nothing that prevents it in the rules.

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Other than that you've just undone what you all said on camera and that to the press, by the way, who's here.

COUNCILWOMAN DALIMONTE: But it puts it on -- you want this --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: You voted, you voted, we're done.

COUNCILWOMAN LURVEY: You want this project to move forward so why not put it on the agenda?

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm gonna make a motion --

SUPERVISOR DESENA: Please call the next item.

COUNCILMAN TROIANO: I'm gonna remake my motion to reconsider the previous item, and so the motion would be, do we vote to reconsider the previous item.

COUNCILMAN WALSH: What a joke.

Capital expenditures can range from road resurfacing, rehabilitation of Town owned facilities, and the procurement of heavy-duty equipment.

The capital plan is a fluid planning document that the Town Board updates each year in a collaborative process which helps to outline the major projects the Town Board intends to pursue over the next five years. The plan also shows the proposed funding schedule for each project – whether through bonding, existing cash on-hand, funding from contractual agreements, grants, or FEMA obligated projects.

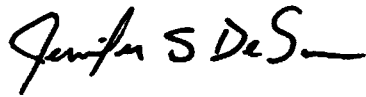
This capital plan was crafted with input from each council person on the Board, and I want to thank each of them for their hard work identifying projects important to their districts, and Town-wide, as we seek to not just maintain, but improve our parks and our Town infrastructure.

The capital planning process is intended to be fully transparent. We conducted a public work session that provided an overview of the plan, and representatives from each department were on-hand to answer specific questions. During 2022, the Town completed numerous projects throughout every corner of our great Town. Going forward, the Town remains committed to making capital improvements for the future of our Town. With that in mind, as Town Supervisor, I will always be careful to balance this plan by taking a fiscally conservative approach.

The costs outlined in this document come from preliminary estimates, construction cost estimates provided by outside firms, existing contracts, and recent bid openings. Every effort will be made to find lower cost options when available and to maximize grant funding, without compromising the quality of our projects.

The General Fund allocated projects of the Capital Plan includes the requirement to borrow \$47.48 million over the five years of the Plan. The Town Outside Village allocated projects of the Capital Plan includes the requirement to borrow of \$42.66 million over the five years of the Plan.

Bonds of the Town in the principal amount of not to exceed \$812,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called the "Law"), to finance said appropriation.

Section 3. Section 3. The following additional matters are hereby determined and declared:

(a) The period of probable usefulness of the specific object(s) or purpose(s) for which \$50,000 of said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 28 of the Law, is five (5) years.

(b) The period of probable usefulness of the specific object(s) or purpose(s) for which \$89,000 of said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 28 of the Law, is ten (10) years.

(c) The period of probable usefulness of the specific object(s) or purpose(s) for which \$673,000 said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 28 of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be applied to reimburse the Town for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 5. The proposed maturity of the bonds authorized by this resolution will exceed five years.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the Town, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the Town. The faith and credit of the Town are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the Town by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 of the Law relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and Section 50.00 and Sections 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Town Board relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes and prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes, and the powers and duties relative to executing contracts for credit enhancements and providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer of the Town.

Section 8. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

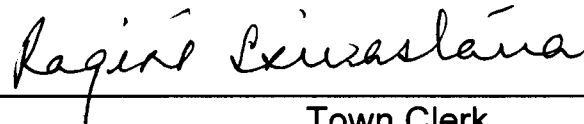

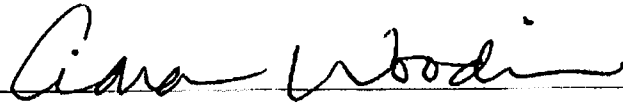

Section 3. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 19(c) of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be applied to reimburse the Town for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 5. The proposed maturity of the bonds authorized by this resolution will exceed five years.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the Town, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the Town. The faith and credit of the Town are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual

THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF NORTH HEMPSTEAD, IN THE COUNTY OF NASSAU, NEW YORK, HEREBY RESOLVES (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of said Town Board) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Town of North Hempstead, in the County of Nassau, New York (herein called the "Town"), is hereby authorized to construct parking lot improvements at Michael J. Tully Park. The estimated maximum cost thereof, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof, is \$6,000,000 and \$2,000,000 is hereby appropriated for such purpose, in addition to the \$4,000,000 heretofore appropriated for such purpose pursuant to Resolution No. 824-2016, duly adopted by the Town Board on December 13, 2016 and Resolution No. 633-2018 duly adopted by the Town Board on December 18, 2018 (the "Prior Bond Resolutions"). The plan of financing includes the issuance of the \$2,000,000 bonds to finance said additional appropriation, in addition to the \$4,000,000 bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to the Prior Bond Resolutions, and the levy and collection of taxes on all the taxable real property in the Town to pay the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable.

Section 2. In addition to the \$4,000,000 bonds of the Town authorized pursuant to the Prior Bond Resolutions, bonds of the Town in the principal amount of not to exceed \$2,000,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called the "Law"), to finance said additional appropriation.

Section 3. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Sections 11.00 a. 20 (f) of the Law, is ten (10) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be applied to reimburse the Town for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 5. The proposed maturity of the bonds authorized by this resolution will exceed five years.

Section 6. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation

notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the Town, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the Town. The faith and credit of the Town are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the Town by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 7. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 of the Law relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and Section 50.00 and Sections 56.00 to 60.00 and Section 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Town Board relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes and prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes, and the powers and duties relative to executing contracts for credit enhancements and providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer of the Town.

Section 8. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of such resolution, or a summary thereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- (c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the constitution.

Section 9. This bond resolution is subject to a permissive referendum and the Town Clerk of said Town of North Hempstead is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be published, in full, within ten days after the adoption of this resolution, in "Newsday" and "Nassau Illustrated News," which are hereby designated the official newspapers of the Town for such publication, and posted on the sign board of the Town maintained pursuant to the Town Law, a Notice in substantially the following form:

In addition to the \$100,000 bonds of the Town authorized pursuant to the Prior Bond Resolution, bonds of the Town in the principal amount of not to exceed \$300,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called the "Law"), to finance said additional appropriation.

Section 3. The period of probable usefulness applicable to the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 19(c) of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be applied to reimburse the Town for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes and Section 50.00 and Sections 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Town Board relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes and prescribing the terms, form and contents and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said bond anticipation notes, and the powers and duties relative to executing contracts for credit enhancements and providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer of the Town.
